1. Welcome, Call to Order, and Room Introductions

2. Approval of Minutes

- Glenn Gillespie made a motion to approve the minutes as presented, seconded by Gene Donaldson and unanimously approved by voting members of the Council in attendance.

Secretary Schiliro started the meeting by introducing and welcoming two new members Councilman G. Jody Sweeny and Commissioner Rob Coupe.

3. PUBLIC SESSION - Recurring Business:

- **Strategy** – Secretary Schiliro briefed members on DSP active shooter training and the New Castle County Courthouse shooting while waiting for the DIAC representative to arrive. He felt that we have a lot to be thankful for following this incident. The officers performed as they were trained to, which was to clear the courthouse from the top down and to aggressively engage the armed intruder.

- This Council meets to discuss a lot of issues that are very important and the courthouse shooting showed they work. He requested that Kurt Reuther fine-tune Delaware's Strategies following this event to focus in on Active Shooter training, which the Council will discuss later. What all of us are really dealing with now in terms of Delaware courthouses is bringing the other courthouses up to the same level of resources and training as NCCo Courthouse.
- **Colonel Nate McQueen** stated that DSP looked at active shooter training and training of the individual agencies in order to align thought processes and training.
- **Kurt Reuther** briefed members on the Secretary's request tasking him to review some of the smaller agencies training and thought processes. He is planning to hold training particularly for some of the smaller Sussex and Kent County agencies. Of course, this will require the support of the Delaware Police Chiefs. Kurt is considering using a few currently trained officers from the larger agencies to assist in training officers at smaller locations. Kurt requested a contact for the Chiefs' training committee and was told that the committee is part of the WMD working group.
- **Chief Hosfelt** provided members a briefing on the Training Committee's past events, current training events scheduled and what training is being considered in the future. Secretary Schiliro felt that as a state, this is an area where we are weak, although he feels that considering training for the things least expected puts us on the right track.
- **Delaware Information and Analysis Center (DIAC) Governance –**
 - (a) The DIAC is a multi- disciplinary facility whose charter contains a governance requirement falling under the HSAC. Kurt noted that for today there is nothing at this time for the council to consider.
- **Security Briefings:**

Kurt in the absence of a DIAC representative began the initial DIAC briefing –stating that the role of the advisory council is to provide the Secretary with guidance, council, and other needs in order to protect DE and its citizens.

Captain Daniel Meadows arrived to continue the DIAC briefing on international, national, regional, and local security events that occurred since our last meeting.

- The 10th issue of Inspire magazine was released Thursday and included information on tactics, techniques, and procedures that could affect Delaware.
- He briefed members on recent bomb denotations in support of the Taliban. Police intervention stopped some of the incidents prior to detonation.
- Members received an update on recent active shooter incidents and the trend of active shooters to target first responders reminding agencies to continue their pro-active training. Additionally, he briefed members on an active shooter that committed suicide when his roommate turned him in before he was able to act.
- At this time, there is nothing to report regionally or locally specific to Delaware.

Kurt Reuther provided the Homeland Security Briefing sharing information from a recent briefing stating that in terms of looking at terrorism philosophically we are seeing a lot of spin off groups that are showing up here in the U.S.

- Awareness and the ability to report suspicious activity is critical to prevention. However, while suspicious activity reporting remained constant throughout the U. S. it has dropped off significantly locally. Everyone needs to refocus on pushing our reporting message out to Delaware's citizens. This trend is particularly disturbing because Delaware is significantly below the national reporting average.
 - Last year grant funds received allowed targeted messaging reminders on bus placards and billboards.
 - Two years ago we partnered with Allen Metheny (DVFA) to promote the See Something, Say Something message through Fire Service messaging boards and with County government partners to promote it through their messaging boards.
- **Secretary Schiliro** felt that citizens might be complacent because Delaware is a really good place to be. However, he reminded everyone that we are only as good as the information we gather. The better course he advised is to have a greatly improved reporting framework and to get citizens actively engaged in reporting suspicious activity.
- **Secretary Schiliro** feels that we have good resources in place on the Council from federal, state, local government and private sector organizations in order to request outreach. This is particularly important for schools he noted as national reporting trends increase, incidents are being prevented because one student sees another student doing something they should not and reports it to authorities.

- **The Secretary** announced that the President is currently in the Middle East and the situation is less than settled. If the situation over there is set off, we will have to keep a close watch for repercussions in the United States.

SSA Jeff Reising (FBI) reported on an increasing trend of Lone Wolfe incidents wanting to engage fire alarms to shoot everyone as they are exiting the building.

- Additionally, he briefed members on the FBI currently researching why one particular part of the state is experiencing a greater incidence of reporting SARS incidents than in other parts of the state.

Elayne Starkey from DTI briefed members on a cyber-security executive order released in January. The executive order is a watered down version of two senate bills and one house bill that never made it.

- The President's Executive Order Improving Critical Infrastructure Cyber-security directs federal agencies to share cyber information with state, local, and private entities. While there are a lot of new responsibilities with DHS, there is nothing specific for state governments although she is sure that states will see trickle down. Legislative interest remains for this issue.
- Another report that has the security industry abuzz is the Mandiant Intelligence Center's APT1 65 page report on the cyber threat from China. It is a fascinating read and she recommends members download the full version to review. Elayne requested Dee to disseminate a short version of the executive brief prior to the meeting starting.
- Evidence supports allegations that organized espionage unit hackers are receiving sponsored support from the Chinese government. The scale and impact of APT1's operations make them the most persistent of China's threat organizations. Trends for attack vectors changed toward the middle of the network, which are the users. Hackers now attack network access through spear phishing attacks on network users.
- Elayne briefed members on the largest cyber threat ever orchestrated that occurred recently in South Carolina involving an Eastern European hacker compromising the South Carolina Department of Revenue.
- In the South Carolina breach, attackers sent an unsolicited email containing a link that encouraged users to click on the link. When users clicked the link, it enabled malware

that provided hackers the ability to harvest user names and passwords while spreading to provide access over a 2-month period compromising 44 systems, 23 databases and harvesting 74 gigabytes of data. Hackers stole 3.6 million Social Security numbers and 387,000 credit and debit card numbers.

- There is currently a lot of activity going on in South Carolina as they are now beginning to pay for monitoring services for the 3.8 million citizens and 700,000 business affected.
- Delaware's network system alerts administrators if anyone even tries to access our network from outside of the U.S. We all have to ask ourselves if we have users in our organizations that would click on links sent in unsolicited emails.
- DTI is currently conducting targeted controlled simulated spear phishing email testing to raise employee awareness of the dangers involved with indiscriminately clicking on email links. DTI is disseminating emails to all government employees in order to see if they click on embedded email links. Unfortunately, initial numbers were unusually high in terms of the click through rate (8%), although numbers are trending down as the rounds advance.
- Alarmingly, 4% of our employees supplied their user names and passwords to the phishing email request. When employees click on DTI test email links, they see a one page-training screen.
- Elayne responded to a question as to who state employees should report phishing emails to by stating that currently there is not one specific individual. Most state agencies designate an individual for their employees to report IT security incidents. However, she recommends reporting these types of incidents to departmental IT personnel as DTI keeps them informed of trending threats so they can implement security precautions if a significant number are reported.
- Elayne briefed members on one of the state's Phishing test emails disseminated: the Chief Security Officer of the State of Delaware is updating information and requests that you to click on the link to update your information. The email was one that the Delaware Division of Finance specifically requested following South Carolina's recent hacking incident.

- DTI Phishing tests will continue this year expanding to include all network users including the education network.
- The significance of the executive order to Delaware is not much because it does not specifically state anything that Delaware has to do. However, they mentioned NIST and Elayne assured members that Delaware adopts NIST standards.

Todd Karpel (DHS) provided members a briefing on organizations within DHS and their cyber security section NCIC that provides services for several agencies.

- The Department of Homeland Security's National Cybersecurity & Communications Integration Center (NCCIC) triages immediate cyber requirements provides a connective layer between law-enforcement (LE), IC, cyber centers, and state & local (S & L) partners. Additionally, they handle Continuity of Operation Plans (COOP) and Continuity of Operations Government (COOG) related incidents and events.
- DHS Industrial Control Systems Cyber Emergency Response Team (ICS-CERT) provides threat data in support of incidents and mitigation strategies, support packages for flyaway teams, initiate tear-line procedures and provide joint vulnerability/threat presentations to industry.
- The Department of Homeland Security's United States Computer Emergency Team (US-CERT) leads efforts to improve our nation's cyber security posture, coordinate cyber information sharing, and proactively manage national cyber risks. US-CERT strives to be a trusted global leader in cyber security - collaborative, agile, and responsive in a dynamic and complex environment.
- US-CERT takes reported cyber information analyzes it to fuse it with other organization's cyber information in order to disseminate it to those with a need to know. They provide daily situational awareness threat briefings and fulfill requirements to attribute malicious behavior.
- Support to state and local partners as part of fusion center process by allowing use of the MSIAC. One of DHS efforts is to report information and identify chains of information to report up and down the chain nationwide. They participate in bi-weekly Secure Video Teleconference Chats (SVTCs) with fusion centers and receive and fulfill state and local support requests (SLSRs) providing regular, direct support to in excess of 75 State and Local Fusion Center (SLFC) intelligence and report officers. As a Program Management Information Sharing Organization (PMISO) DHS is better than they were in the past.

Nationally for cyber-security our nation remains at the same point that we were around 9/11.

- Private sector cyber-security is a tremendous vulnerability as private sector organizations are concerned about shareholder value. DHS is trying to partner with private sector organizations for information sharing. This information is available at the US CERT website as open source for sharing with your organizations.
- DHS US-CERT is really in infancy stage and still trying to determine the answers to several questions. (1) What do we report? (2) How do we report it? (3) How often do we report it? (4) And to whom do we report it?
- The National Security Agency is reviewing nuclear organizations nationwide to ensure that they are secure.
- The Chinese and Russians remain our biggest threat as far as cyber-security is concerned. Huawei positioned themselves to collect our information

Kurt clarified that in the initial reading of the executive order it builds a bridge for large private sector operators. Delaware's gap is citizenry, government, and the non-Fortune 500 companies lacking the ability to build the infrastructure. From our perspective, we need to look at state and local government shortfalls.

Todd Karpel emphasized important cyber-security issues to members that still need answers including how do we do this and what will work? What if? Todd said that at this time, Al Qaeda is not a significant player in cyber security although it is not beyond them to launch an attack during an all hazard event, as they get better and better.

- For example at E-Bay there is a feeling in those circles that this will not happen to them so there is very little interest in investing in infra-structure.
- Secretary Schiliro stated that the minute a foreign government is involved with cyber-security issues it becomes a significant threat. Financially China's ability to steal financial, research, and patent ideas is significant.
- Secretary suggested cyber security and publically traded companies as a potential theme for the next private sector briefing.

Kurt updated members on a document that he sent out prior to the January meeting addressing Homeland Security spending projects in anticipation of funding discussed during the January meeting.

- After incorporation of Jamie Turner's requested modifications and review of Secretary Schiliro's requested collaborative action pieces, Kurt requested Council action on this matter. Gene Donaldson made a motion to approve the document as revised and disseminated to voting members with an insertion for active shooter training coordination seconded by Chief Hosfelt and unanimously approved by the voting members in attendance.
- **Dwayne Day** felt that there is probably a need to spell some of these out in greater detail relating to risk based and capability based in order to drive the decision making with documentation sent to the working group clarifying that these are not recommendations they are the procedures to identify for all approvals to ensure they are in alignment.
- **Kurt** requested time on the next working group meeting agenda in order to make it clear exactly what the priorities are driving for the funding subcommittee.

Kurt briefed members on a letter received by the Governor's Office looking at federal agencies having an impact on Delaware such as FEMA and the Coast Guard.

- Anticipate funding reductions of approximately \$20,000.00 to the fire service award program. The Homeland Security Grant Program and the Maritime Security Grant Program would be roughly \$360 000.00.
- Sector Delaware Bay Homeland Security is curtailing their activities for Coast Guard activity which includes the coasts of New Jersey, Delaware, and the Delaware Bay for example. Federal funding money is going away rather quickly and competing interests for remaining available funds are increasing exponentially.
- As it stands now the major deficiencies in Delaware occur with the Coast Guard and grant funding reductions. Kurt will disseminate this information via email.
- Kurt briefed members on a state Homeland Security grant funding project model that is very interesting as it looks at threats that are risk based, threat based, vulnerability based, and population based in order to develop an excellent analytical tool that facilitates addressing statewide sequestration cuts. The states using this model were able based on risk, threat, vulnerability and population based models to balance budgets. It is critical now more than ever to address the need to allocate funding where it will do the most good. Kurt suggested considering this type of model in Delaware as we move forward especially with training and equipment maintenance and P-25 radios.
- Delaware saw a \$20,000.00 decrease to fire service funding based on the 2011 program. Allen Metheny stated that he was unaware of a pot of money specifically allocated for fire

service and asked how this will change the dissemination of funds to the fire service. Kurt will reach out to obtain clarification on this issue since it is one with an annual submission from the fire service agencies.

- Kurt informed members that there is no question on the grant picture; stating that Delaware funding received a pretty much 5% across the board cut that is being absorbed through salary position cuts.
- Dr. Aviola and Wilmington University are our partners for the private sector threat briefing scheduled in late spring. Current briefing considerations include the cyber-attack at a facility with guest speakers addressing security concerns involving an attack on Delaware's oil and rail sectors and its effect on refineries. Ed Klima suggested a round table discussion theme for establishing private and public partnerships, and of course, the cyber security and publicly traded organizations issue the Council discussed earlier.
- **Grant Coordination**

Deputy Director Glenn Gillespie provided members a briefing on DEMA activities since our last meeting because Director Jamie Turner was in DC attending a FEMA meeting.

- **FEMA-4090-DR-DE** - Executive Summary #2 as of 3/18/13, declared in response to Hurricane Sandy. DEMA is processing Hurricane Sandy Public Assistance and Mitigation requests from all three counties, with no Individual Assistance requested.
- **Status to date** includes:
 - 56 Requests for Public Assistance's received
 - 56 Kick-off meetings scheduled and completed
 - 110 Project Worksheets (PWs) projected
 - 62 Project Worksheets submitted to Central Processing Center (CPC) thus far, involving in excess of \$2 million dollars.
 - 34 Exit Briefings completed
 - Total Project Worksheets obligated amount thus far is \$449,980 (this is the 75% fed share amount) with a project completion date targeted for April 30 of this year(completion means all PWs submitted to CPC).
- Per agreement with State Director/GAR, Delaware Emergency Management Agency continues to conduct operations with no formal JFO established.
- **Hurricane Preparedness** - DEMA staff received Hurricane preparedness briefings from FEMA during their Brief to States & Regional Administrators on Friday

- The briefings were based on our State's Preparedness Report that was due out 12/31/12,
- Areas that may require mutual aid based on the severity of events include mass search and rescue and mass fatality support, while logistics and incident support bases are established.
- **Planning Issues** – FEMA/DEMA will work to develop established resources needs for a 30 day around the clock support coverage based on Emergency Support Coordinators this spring and summer. To conserve Agency resources, support is being provided from other Region 3 facilities.
- The 2013 Delaware Emergency Operations Plan (DEOP) was recently updated and forwarded to the Governor for his signature.
- DEMA staff is compiling and completing Delaware's Hazard Mitigation plan for submission and approval of FEMA by July, as well as reformatting and updating the companion Radiological Emergency Plan (REP) with a projected completion date of December of this year.
- **Exercises** - This year's exercises include a joint recovery exercise for the peninsula planned to occur in May or June and a statewide tabletop exercise planned for September or October.
- **Grant Status** - All grants prior to FY10 closed with the FY10 grant closing June 30 of this year.
- Current proposed FY13 totals for the Homeland Security (HS) & Emergency Management Performance Grants (EMPG) expect reductions totaling 6.25% based on based on sequester and Congressional action pending final vote by both Houses.
- **DHS/FEMA** - Homeland Security (HS) & Emergency Management Grants (EMG) per Post Katrina legislation cancelled due to sequester.
- **Audits** – Delaware's state single book annual audit completed with no findings.

4. **Federal, State, Local & Private Sector Briefings:**

Steve Blessing provided members with the DHSS/DPH briefing assuring everyone that Delaware is on the downside of the flu. This year's flu season combined with outbreaks of the Nora Virus put significant strain on the healthcare systems. However, DHSS/DPH emphasized significant lessons learned as far as the need for getting out in front of the season with more aggressive vaccination opportunities.

- Three threats he briefed members about include:
 - (1) A SARS like virus seen in the Middle East with numbers currently relatively small, which is being closely watched due to its ability to transfer from human to human and its high mortality rate. Steve emphasized that no cases have originated in the U.S.; although a 15-month-old child that travelled to the U.S. from China died from this SARS like virus. He asked everyone to be aware.
 - (2) A virus also known as the Corona Virus providing some concerns with deployed soldiers returning to the Nation, however numbers are small. Tami flu resistant strain has turned up in about 2% of the cases worldwide so far. If we were to have another H1N1 Virus resistant to Tami Flu, it would push the death rates higher.
 - (3) Antibiotic resistant infections in hospitals continue to be a concern although localized to health care systems and people that have under lying immunities issues.

Virus deaths remain of concern in addition to the above three threats although not considered a direct threat at this time.

- Steve briefed members on a visit from the CDC this week stating that he expects to continue to see reductions in funding because of the sequestration.
- **DHSS/DPH** 4 year exercise plans for Delaware include: (1)
 - (1) Testing their hospital plans and different components of their response plans
 - (2) The major exercise is scheduled toward the end of the grant cycle and includes testing their Emergency Operations Center and the work they are doing there;
 - (3) Additionally, their exercise plans include working on improving their information dissemination.
- Steve noted that Wesley College is beginning to attract foreign students especially from China. Wesley College contacted DHSS/DPH to inquire if there were screenings available for these foreign students.

Secretary Schiliro briefed members on a recent Statewide Emergency Response Commission (SERC) meeting where Norfolk-Southern Railway briefed SERC members on Norfolk-Southern freight service to PBF/Delaware City Refinery.

- Local emergency response members raised concerns with an issue involving current train lengths consisting of 100 rail cars blocking rail crossings for extended times interfering with

first responder access routes followed by a lively discussion related to public safety issues.

- Railroad emergency and routine contact numbers provided:

- **Gene Donaldson** announced the cancellation of tomorrow's scheduled meeting although it will be rescheduled. DeIDOT is looking into automating the trains crossing signals similar to Pre-Empt intersections to make traffic signals change differently when a train is approaching the Pre-Empt crossings.

Secretary Schiliro felt the private sector briefings have done a great job of educating Delaware's private sector leaders.

Further discussion concerned a Human Resources group presentation on active shooters the prior week and a Chamber of Commerce presentation relating to obtaining a better flow of information to and from small to middle business groups. Kurt will meet with DEMA and DIAC representatives to try to address coordinated outreach for this group.

Secretary Schiliro is looking to expand the HSAC and requested members to notify Kurt of potential members from that sector.

Ed Klima advised members that since this year's music festival occurs three weeks after the NASCAR race Dover Motorsports combined their outreach and planning.

- The music festival has the potential to grow and while Ed felt that it is probably here to stay, and that managed growth is critical to any event's successful growth. If Dover Motorsports is unable to get people into the event and facilitate a smooth departure from the event, people will not attend. Ed feels that it is important that all of their partners take lessons learned from NASCAR's growth and incorporate it into planned growth for the Firefly music event.
- Ed felt that last year's Firefly Music Festival was successful with only two arrests over the entire three-day event. The fact that attendees come to the event and stay is a big dynamic although it does presents other challenges.
- Already this year event promoters sold more tickets in one day than were sold for this event all of last year. Last year's attendance was approximately 25,000 per day with 60% (15,000

attendees) staying and 40% (10,000 attendees) commuting. Ed assured members that the event site received significant infrastructure build up to support this type of event.

Secretary Schiliro advised members that if Delaware is going to hold this type of events, he felt that Dover Downs is an ideal location to do it because it already has in place the ability, planning, coordination, infrastructure, and experience to host large-scale events successfully. These types of events are nice and bring a lot of good will and funding to Delaware. Planning is critical to ensuring that well run events.

Joe Wessels - DTI and the League of Local Governments partnered to try to keep cyber- security and terrorism awareness heightened. Joe felt that their recent sell-out attendance for cyber- security and terrorism awareness briefings at DSU was an indication of the need and interest in these topics. On behalf of League, he thanked the Delaware Homeland Security Terrorism Preparedness Working Group (DHSTPWG) and the Department of Information Technology (DTI) for funding and managing this event.

Secretary Schiliro reminded everyone that you act as you train.

Ed Klima represented NASCAR at a major sporting event that allows facilities certification. This event addressed numerous certifications including addressing: "What are some of the big issues?" Concern over screening of patrons entering facilities is one. Security wanting to install and use magnetometers is creating a huge log jam at entry points which in turn creates potential vulnerabilities. Science and technology funding has dried up to allow looking into how to screen entry and not create a vulnerability threat.

Secretary Schiliro briefed members on lessons learned from Inaugural planning meetings and the Governor's Inaugural Ball.

ACTION ITEMS

FY12 Homeland Security Grant Program

- Determine Delaware gaps and needs resulting from Sector Delaware Bay Homeland Security and Coast Guard sequestration funding induced activity reduction.
- Kurt to brief April 8th Delaware Homeland Security Terrorism Preparedness Working Group members to clarify risked and capability based decision making process to ensure funding approvals are in alignment with Delaware's 2013 HSAC Priorities.

FY12 Emergency Management Performance Grant (EMPG)

- Coordinate meeting between Dwayne Day, Kurt, DEMA and DIAC representatives to address coordinated outreach to small and middle private business sector.
- Plan to address needs and gaps Delaware will incur because of expected reductions in emergency management performance grants and the cancellation of the DHS FEMA and Homeland Security grants due to sequestration cuts. Federal guidance states that the grants are strictly for emergency management functions. The EMPG grant is a matched grant dollar for dollar and prohibits the match coming from other federal funds.

Examine

- Implementation of the Homeland Security grant funding project model that looks at risk based, threat based, vulnerability based, and population based threats to develop an analytical tool to facilitate addressing statewide sequestration cuts.
- Facilitate bringing Kent and Sussex County courthouses up to the same level of resources and training as NCCo Courthouse.

Research

- Kurt to obtain additional information on the \$20,000.00 decrease to fire service funding in order to ascertain how it will affect allocation of fire service funds.
- Partner with Fire Service, County and local municipalities statewide to share “See Something, Say Something” message on their message signs and official communications.

Follow up

- Coordinate smaller law-enforcement agency’s active shooter training.
- Refocus government, private sector to reinforce Delaware’s See Something, Say Something reporting message for employees and Delaware’s citizens.
