



**Delaware Thoroughbred Racing Commission
Minutes of Regular Meeting Held On
July 16, 2014**

1. WELCOME & CALL TO ORDER

At 10:15 a.m., Chairman Duncan Patterson called the meeting to order.

2. APPROVAL OF MINUTES

Upon a motion duly made (Stegemeier) and seconded (Levine), minutes of June 12, 2014 were approved.

3. OLD BUSINESS

A. Equine Testing Laboratory

Chairman Patterson stated that this has been a very challenging time for all of us. We, as a Commission, stand behind our decision to employ this lab. Dr. Sams is one of the foremost chemists in the country. They have the foremost, cutting edge equipment. That being said there are no excuses for the delays we have encountered. He spoke with Dr. Sams on Monday and indicated he would forward a report. Chairman Patterson shared a portion of the letter that Dr. Sams send and was received this morning. "Dear Chairman Patterson, LGC eliminated a backlog of overdue screening reports toward the end of June. Since June 30 has issued screening reports on or before the due date. During that time LGC has issued 12 of 19 final reports on or before the due date. Later final reports during this period are due to findings for prohibitive substances in these samples. LGC is working diligently to firm confirmatory analysis on suspicious samples. We have grouped samples with the same or similar preliminary findings together in order to test them more efficiently. We propose to test the pending samples in the order shown below." He provides a schedule which would clear everything within 9 days. The letter concludes with "The remaining suspicious samples (which Chairman Patterson did not name) will be subjected to confirmatory analysis after the samples identified above have been analyzed and reported. We've prioritized findings from July 5 because we know they were stakes races on that date. If we should not prioritize those samples, please let us know and we will reprioritize them." Chairman Patterson opened the floor for comments from the Commissioners who had no comment. The floor was then passed to Bill Fasy.

Bill Fasy stated that in order to alleviate some of the problems, he approached the horsemen and met with Bessie Gruwell and Mike Gorham. Mr. Fasy requested they consider paying out what they are aware of from the purse funds and if there was a problem down the road, they would come back and try to collect the money back from the individuals that may have got paid but later there is an adjustment and they end up losing the purse. Ms. Gruwell and Mr. Gorham drafted something which Mr. Fasy took to his attorney who recommended that they do an amendment to the existing agreement. The horsemen's attorney was on vacation last week and Mr. Fasy has not heard any responses. Mr. Fasy put something together and presented to John Mooney and is presenting this to the Board as it does involve something obscure from the purse account. It would be paid out after 14 days (4 days [96 hours] + 10 days) per the contracted timeline with LGC. It is unusual as it involves purse money and the fact if someone does have to pay Delaware Park back, they will have to send a letter and ask for it to be paid back. The problem is having to go through the normal process of the Racing Commission, the Stewards, etc. and the Delaware law on collections gets muddy. Mr. Fasy gave a reference on collections in Delaware law – if an

individual got unjustly enriched or benefited from something or didn't pay a bill back, a letter is sent and if it is not repaid within a reasonable period of time, the State police are contacted and a warrant is put out for that individual's arrest. It changes when an agreement or a payment plan is established. Delaware Park will, from time to time, enter into a payment plan as long as it is reasonable. Delaware Park is asking the Horsemen to consider that the purse account guarantee any collection problems that do not get paid. We do have an amendment to our contract. Delaware Park would not normally ask the Racing Commission to get involved in contractual issues, but this involves the purse account which is under the Racing Commission's jurisdiction. He is hoping to alleviate rumors that Delaware Park does not have the money to pay which is not the case, just the matter of circumstances and positive lab results. This would also help with someone having money in a claiming account and takes the hold off the claiming account.

Chairman Patterson asked Bessie Gruwell if they were in agreement with this. Ms. Gruwell indicated their attorney does not want to do it through a contract. Since it is a short term problem, they feel it should not be a contractual item but should be an agreement. Bill Fasy stated his attorney would not agree to that.

Mr. Stegemeier asked if they can require personal guarantees from people before the funds are released? Mr. Fasy said yes, but that involves a change in the collection process which he feels is efficient from their perspective. Once you enter into an agreement outside of that process, the State police do not get involved.

Chairman Patterson indicated this is a business decision for Delaware Park and the Commission has historically not entered into interfering with any business decisions or making comments on business decisions. However, there are tracks that do pay out the purse money prior to the track getting confirmatory analysis. Mr. Fasy indicated he is aware but is also aware of the large balance of accounts receivable that Delaware Park eats on a regular basis for fees that are not collected (approx. \$85,000), so from a perspective of that business decision Delaware Park is not willing to do that.

Ms. Gruwell stated that this is not a Delaware Park or Horsemen's problem, it is a laboratory problem. We are looking to put a band aid on a problem that is unacceptable. There are 26 outstanding tests on hold. 2 positives from May that haven't been addressed. Chairman Patterson interjected that all 26 of them do not exceed the 10 days so not all 26 are out of compliance. Bessie said that she knows there are about 20% coming back cloudy. She has called other regions, Penn National and Parks are putting warnings on their overnights that the stuff is inaccurate, there is going to be new research done. Maryland did this January through the Belmont with one positive and no problems. If we are all supposed to be in compliance and all the labs are supposed to do the same thing what is this lab doing differently? Chairman Patterson stated that he could not answer this. Ms. Gruwell indicated we met with the lab, John Wayne has visited with them and told them to get the oldest suspicious samples done first but there are still outstanding samples from May. Ms. Gruwell and John Mooney stated what has been done is not working. Mr. Mooney stated he has owners calling him every day.

Commissioner Decker asked Ms. Gruwell what would be her solution. Ms. Gruwell stated find a new lab, someone who could do the job. Commissioner Decker indicated that some of the Commissioners are inclined to explore that option. This is a contractual agreement and the Commission needs some legal advice. The Commission needs to agree on this. Commissioner Stegemeier stated that nothing would be able to be done before the end of this meet and understands that this does not seem acceptable. There is no way to end this contract and find someone to take over. There is a process that this has to go through. This is a major problem that everyone has been working on. In the meantime, Delaware has to find a way to make this work. The problem exists here in Delaware because the horsemen are not getting paid, that is the real problem. If the horsemen were getting paid we would figure out a way to work this out. Part of the solution is to push the lab to get up to speed but Delaware Park and the Horsemen need to get together and work out a solution at this end..

Bessie Gruwell feels the RMTTC needs to be contacted and needs to address this lab because they are not adhering to what they need to do to be accredited. Commissioner Stegemeier agreed and indicated there would be no argument from the Commission. They are not proud of this situation. They tried to pick the best lab who is actually saving money but ultimately is costing more money. They thought they made a good decision and they are not happy. This is a short-term issue and everyone needs to work together to work through it. What do "we do" not the Commission but all of us?

Ms. Gruwell commented that there are 2 tests outstanding from May that have not been confirmed or released. John Wayne confirmed there are 2 samples outstanding from May 26 and May 28. They are on hold. There are a total of 27 samples on hold. The Lab is back on schedule as of the June 26 meeting and have been adhering to

the 96 hours. It is the confirmatory process of the suspicious samples that is the backup. It is not an instrument issue but an analytical data review process issue.

Bill Fasy indicated in the 18 years he has worked here he has never had a problem with the way the payment process works from the perspective of the horsemen and Delaware Park. He felt it was unfair to say the lab was not doing their job; they are doing their job; they are finding stuff that is out there, but not meeting deadlines. Mr. Fasy advised that he was not here to comment on the lab but to present a solution that might temporarily solve the problem.

Ms. Gruwell referred to a warning from the Overnight: "Attention horsemen: When using Methocarbamol in conjunction with Bute, it is possible the recommended withdrawal time of 48 hours for Methocarbamol is inaccurate. The latest research indicates a minimum of 72 hours should be used if using in conjunction with Bute. Please adjust your pre-race treatments accordingly." Ms. Gruwell called RMTC (Racing Medication and Testing Consortium), Allan Foreman, and he said he was not aware of this. Chairman Patterson asked John Wayne to contact Dr. Dionne Benson to confirm this. Dr. Benson texted Mr. Wayne during the meeting (10:45a.m.) and stated it was based on research by Dr. Mary Scollay mixing Methocarbamol and Phenylbutazone (Bute). It does not account for just the use of Methocarbamol. Chairman Patterson recommended the same statement be put on Delaware Park's overnights.

Commissioner Killeen commented that the Commission hears their frustration and are all equally frustrated. Everyone needs to pull together to make this work. Commission, Delaware Park and the horsemen need to figure out how to get through this now. The horsemen need to be paid fair and equitably. Bill Fasy and Bessie Gruwell both agree they do not mind if their lawyers work together on this. Michael Gorham felt that the horsemen would be okay with a separate short-term contract through the end of the meet that does not affect the original contract. Debbie Killeen stated it sounds like everyone is on the same page. Get it done and get the meet underway and pay the horsemen, and the Commission will do its job. The Commission works very diligently to make sure that each event is a fair and equitable race every time it comes out of the gate.

Jack Houghton indicated there are problems with sending the split samples out. He has called five labs and they are all backed up. Joe Strug indicated last year that this would be a problem with the system that is set up and as there are only so many accredited labs. We do have a problem but don't think it is just us.

Bessie Gruwell mentioned that for the samples on hold for suspicious results, it would be nice to notify the horsemen of what they are close on. Jack Houghton indicated they did that in the past just for therapeutic medications. They do not get a report from this lab indicating what it is. Mr. Houghton can call Dr. Sams and ask for this information for therapeutic medications.

Commissioner Levine believes the contract with LGC is a multi-year contract. He believes the Commission and counsel should look into termination of this contract immediately. Look into reinstatement/renegotiation of that contract with new conditions and reparations from them moving forward. Price concessions for the future for damages that they have created, provisions in that contract that if they miss a date next year we have the right to go to another lab at their cost. I don't believe we should continue with this lab. It is imperative that the Commission look at termination and reinstatement/renegotiations of this contract. They should be responsible for the problems created by their problems. Not a formal motion at this time, but may be in a future meeting.

A question was asked about the \$1,200 for split samples that horseman and owners are required to pay. It is not refundable. How much is the lab getting paid and where is the other money going. Mr. Houghton indicated he called different labs and all charge about the same. The lab gets the total amount.

Bill Fasy indicated he needs the Commission to bless the issue of using the purse account. Frank Broujos would like a legal review and will look into the Commission's authority in approving the utilization of the purse account. Secretary Kee believes that the Commission and the Department of Agriculture can authorize the use of the purse, especially in a temporary situation. He asked what the economic impact is. If the Commission and Department of Agriculture are making a decision on using the purse they need to know how much money is involved. It was stated the amount is approximately \$250,000.00. Secretary Kee felt that he could get approval to use the purse money but there would have to be legal review. Bill Fasy indicated that it would be coming out of Delaware Park's money. It would even out by the end of the meet.

B. Maryland Claiming Rule Discussion (Voiding a Claim)

Commissioner Stegemeier recommended dropping the discussion and not coming back to it based on all information received to date. Chairman Patterson agreed to compromise by putting it off until November.

John Wayne reviewed the survey results and it was agreed to close the agenda item. Chairman Decker stated that if this is brought up again, he wants an explanation of the word "catastrophic" and an assessment of what this will do to the Commission's vets.

C. Ban of Personal Communications in Jockey's Room

John Wayne provided a survey and summarized it by indicating that some tracks do allow and some do not allow. Mr. Wayne, the Stewards and the Race Track were not in favor of it. He does not see that a change is needed. A change would require a rule change because the rule states that jockeys are sequestered. Mr. Levine confirmed that it seems to be more of an inconvenience than a need. He found that the public perception issue is very important. Debbie Killeen asked what the time frame is for not using their cell phones. Jack Houghton indicated it is approximately 4 hours and confirmed there is a phone available for them at the Clerk of Scales. Bessie Gruwell indicated their cell phones are there with the Clerk of Scales if there is an urgent need.

Robert Colton reiterated what he said previously that the world has changed. There are a lot of riders that do communicate with text and emails. The amount of shipping that happens makes communications with their agents critical. There is no assistant clerk or custodian so there is no one to answer the phones. Trainers are communicating directly with the riders when shipping happens. Riders and trainers are allowed to use their phones at some tracks.

John Mooney indicated he would not object to it and feels it is a minor problem. Bessie Gruwell indicated the horsemen have not discussed it, but she would suggest that they not do it on the porch where it is visible. Jack Houghton disagreed.

Chairman Patterson made a motion to bring this topic to closure. The Commission was not ready to close this topic. Commissioner Levine would like to have more personal input: is it adversely affecting anyone? He would like for John Wayne and the Stewards to feel this out and hear how it is working at other tracks. Chairman Patterson suggested the topic be tabled, Commissioner Levine moved to do so and Commissioner Killeen & Stegemeier seconded, all agreed.

4. NEW BUSINESS

A. Econometric Study of the Horse Racing Industry– Ed Kee, Delaware Secretary of Agriculture

Secretary Kee spoke about Senate Bill 220 which was passed July 1, 2014 related to the structure between all type of gambling income relative to the purses and the economic impact of the racing industry within the state. This bill established that certain video lottery will be deducted prior to calculation of the states share of revenue, the states share of gross table games will be revised to 15% (it was in the 30% area), the table game license fee will be eliminated beginning fiscal year 2015. It is about some financial relief to the Racinos. No changes are being made to the revenue sharing model as it relates to the purses for the Harness and Thoroughbred industries. The purse structure will remain the same.

Part of the bill requires the Secretary of Agriculture to commission a independent study to determine the economic impact of Delaware's Thoroughbred and Standardbred industry on Delaware's agriculture economy and regular economy. There are two pieces: 1. the economic impact of the stables, training centers, etc. What is generated? How much expenditures filter through the economy and 2. debate between horsemen and the tracks on Delaware horses vs. out-of-state. What is the percentage, starts, how much purses earned by Delaware horses at Delaware tracks and out-of-state tracks in the regions.

The University of Delaware College of Business and Economics will be helping with the study as well as a professor from the Agricultural Department that has done this kind of study, who will be in on the discussion. We will also be interacting with the USTA and the NTRA for data. Will have some statisticians in our department that will be involved in collecting data. The bill requires the two horsemen's associations and the tracks to provide basic information so we can send out the survey. This is a six month project.

5. REPORT FROM DTRC EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

A. Summary of Activities Report for May

Mr. Wayne attended the 2014 Welfare and Safety of the Race Horse Summit at Keeneland. It was very informative about using data to keep horses safe. A couple of times during the conference, Delaware was complimented on being very progressive in the way we do our pre-race inspections, our veterinarian staff and their dedication to ensuring the health and welfare of the horse, the fact that we get major support from the race track and horsemen's association in making those programs work well. They talked about making safety a priority in your racing company in reference to a safety committee that we have here. There was talk about the emergency warning system we have installed around the race track. Delaware Park is a model for safety. Inter-articular joint therapies were discussed, which was very interesting. Dr. Carl Mattacola, Division Director and Assistant Professor of Athletic Training at the University of Kentucky, gave a discussion on the jockey industry database to ensure that injuries are being looked at and to create a benchmark for future reports. Mindy Coleman and Terry Meyocks commented on the policy that the DTRC and Delaware Park have of sending the accident video to the hospital and how well it works.

6 REPORT FROM DTRC CHIEF COMMISSION VETERINARIAN

A. Health Report

John T. Peters, D.V.M., Chief Commission Veterinarian made the following report:

There were 5 racing fatalities in June. Dr. Peters indicated this was the most there have been during his 22 years at Delaware Park. Every animal is looked over three to four times before they race. Most of these were ship-ins; 2 were two year olds and their legs were sound with no defects during examination. One was a cannon bone with medial sesamoid, one with a condylar fracture, one both sesamoids were broken, one cannon bone broken, one short pastern bone was broken. Two finished the race, one pulled up after the wire. He does not know of any other reason for this other than racing. Dr. Peters spoke with John Mooney several times and the track is in good condition.

In July, 1 horse foundered, all four feet, and had to be put to sleep. One horse broke an ankle in racing. One horse, 2 year old, broke both knees in training.

Barn 34 was having a mosquito problem. Mosquito control said they would and that they checked on the sentinel chickens and right now Delaware Park does not have a problem.

Discussion ensued around the quality of the race horses here at Delaware Park and the sale of race horses. Commissioner Stegemeier asked Dr. Peters his opinion of the quality of the shipped in horses vs. the horses stabled at Delaware Park. Dr. Peters felt the overall condition of the shipped in horses is good. Commissioner Stegemeier questioned the fact that most of the breakdowns are from ship ins. Dr. Peters stated that these horses may get worked harder or may have been trained less. Three of the ones lost were two year olds and two were green three year olds. Dr. Peters indicated there is no explanation. The track is good, they have studied it and reviewed it. John Mooney speculated that maybe there was a problem with the blood lines. The horses are young. Delaware Park does thorough testing on the surface and on the base. John Wayne shared that it came up at the Summit that trainers who do not race their horses as two year olds subject them to more risk breaking down as three year olds. Apparently racing them as two year olds makes them stronger.

7. REPORT FROM DELAWARE THOROUGHBRED HORSEMEN'S ASSOCIATION

A. Delaware Certified Thoroughbred Program Report

DTHA Executive Director, Bessie Gruwell filed the following report:

There have been 32 horses come through April to June. 143 horses started 210 times for 31 winners, 28 seconds and 24 thirds. \$301,930 has been awarded. The new balance as of June is \$796,846.40.

8. PUBLIC COMMENT

Robert Colton mentioned on Saturday, July 26, 2014, the Permanent Disabled Jockey's Fund spearheaded by John Mooney. The riders will be there signing. There will be a mechanical horse. John Wayne reminded the Commission that they are due to donate \$5,000.00, the 2nd installment of their \$15,000 pledge. He will contact the Department of Agriculture to have them issue that check.

Bessie Gruwell detailed Chapter 2 (attached), a program that looks at ex-Delaware Park horses and where they are today. This raises awareness that these horses are not all being treated badly. A copy will be included with the programs.

10. ADJOURNMENT

At approximately 12:20 P.M., Chairman Patterson entered a motion (Stegemeier) to go into Executive Session which was seconded (Killeen) . The next Commission meeting is scheduled for August 13, 2014 at 10:15 A.M.
