## **2. Approval of Minutes**

- **Gene Donaldson** made a motion to approve the minutes as presented, which was seconded by **Ed Klima** and unanimously approved by voting members of the Council in attendance.

## **Secretary Schiliro**

- Thanked everyone for coming and requested that Captain Daniel Meadows provide members with a security briefing.

## **3. PUBLIC SESSION - Recurring Business:**

- DIAC Governance – N/A
- Security Briefings: **Captain Daniel Meadows** provided members a briefing on international, national, regional, and local security events that occurred since our last meeting.
  - He briefed everyone on recent events in Chicago and the use of social media for recruiting overseas fighters, and dissemination of information supporting terrorist activities. Groups that want to do us harm have exploited social media to target U. S. official personnel. Within the last couple of days Baltimore PD put out a bulletin to media and law-enforcement on various gangs organizing to take out law-enforcement.
  - The New Jersey Fusion Center highlighted increased concern for swatting trends (the intentional reporting of false emergency situations to trigger a response) These are very expensive endeavors used as a prank, revenge, and to further attempts for an ambush style attack on law-enforcement. This is a trend among the gaming community. New Jersey saw quite a few incidents in 2013 and 2014. He covered indicators of a swatting call. Although you may not be the intended victim, you may be targeted to pass on that information to 911. Be aware of similar and previous hoaxes. It is important for everyone here to be aware.
  - Ingress, a mobile device, is a GPS dependent game where participants will go out to different locations and create a portal. We are going to see a lot of this. Gamers are encouraged to check-in to newly created portals to take photographs, make multiple trips to these locations, or assemble mass gatherings at a specific time. It is a fairly-popular game that could result in false SARS reporting.
  - Current outreach initiatives our PLT Tim Kerstetter is assigned and fully functional. In response to the Al Shahab video that encouraged attacks against retailers the DIAC reached out to retailers with training for Active Shooter incidents. Feedback was overwhelming and is a success story. They also conducted training with Fire and EMS personnel. He has the ability to train on a wide variety of topics. If interested, they are willing to come out and engage groups of various sizes.
  - **Captain Meadows** provided a brief update on the DE ISAC stating that Elayne and he attended the National Cyber Security Summit on behalf of the Governor for the National Governor's Association. They were charged with making recommendations to the steering group to take back to the Governor. Ron Bounds has sent letters out to all the

leaders of the 16 critical infrastructure sectors to develop better communication dissemination to all sectors and to develop what will be the membership of the DE ISAC once it is stood up.

- He provided further information on the efforts of the DE ISAC Steering Committees' efforts to develop a structure and mission concept for the DE ISAC.

#### 6. State, Federal, Local & Private Briefings

- **Elayne Starkey** reported further on the Delaware ISAC Steering Committee (DE-ISAC) formation efforts stating that in her opinion the steering committee is making good progress. They initially thought they were behind other states, but based on research they are no longer concerned about that. New Jersey just stood up their ISAC, "NJCIC" although their official launch is not until October. They met with the University of Delaware (U of D) to get the academic perspective. UD is very interested in becoming a part of the DE-ISAC with special concentration on small to medium sized business. This is definitely good progress. We are eager to take all of the research and turn it into an action plan. They have concrete goals set for the next quarter.
  - **Secretary Schiliro** stated that so much of the expertise lies with the academic section. His opinion is that he would like to expand that. He would be interested in hearing from Delaware State and Wilmington University.
  - **Elayne Starkey** advised that Dr. Starnes Walker at the U of D has pulled together a consortium of academia and is working on an MOU with all the academic institutions. Elayne is part of the Cyber Challenge Coordinating Council and runs annual summer camps. They already have a good foundation laid for working with all of the academic partners.
  - **Elayne Starkey** stated that the U of D has a model that they believe works in the agricultural world and feel like that same model would work in the cyber arena as well

within academia to identify risks and vulnerabilities that need attention from the business community.

- **Captain Meadows** is excited to see those logical points of distribution among the small to medium business that lack the technical expertise to handle the cyber issues.
- **Ray Holcomb** feels that the construct of this idea is coming together. The biggest challenge that we are going to face is not information sharing with federal entities but rather the big private corporations that are reluctant to share their problems with us. We need to work on breaking down that barrier and opening up the lines of communication.
- **Secretary Schiliro** welcomed Jennifer Welsh from the U.S. District Attorney's Office to our meetings. He stated that wanted to talk a little more about Baltimore as he has received quite a few calls. From his perspective, that first night they were ill-prepared.
  - **Captain Meadows** stated that a lot of the social media contained information as to when events would occur.
  - The Secretary's hope is that Delaware would more than likely have been in a better position mainly in pre-preparation. He believes that last night went better once the National Guard was called in along with a lot of extra police officers. The down side is the idea of destroying businesses in their own areas. The only drug store where they can get their prescriptions filled is now burned down.
  - **Director Jamie Turner** stated that starting Sunday night at 11:00 p.m. the state leaders had a teleconference to coordinate response. Unbeknownst to them Baltimore leaders were talking separately with local municipalities to obtain assets and some of the municipalities actually sent assets without notifying their emergency managers or the Mayor. Therefore there was a 6 a.m. call Monday morning to agree that if Baltimore wants an asset they have to talk with MEMA who controls the in-state mutual aid agreement. Once this was worked out it is starting to gel for them and Governor Hoban and Governor Christie talked. New Jersey sent in 170 state troopers to assist Baltimore and MD SP to maintain control as much as they possibly can with PA SP coming in later in the week if needed. VA supplied 4 people to do 2 man teams 24 hours around the clock. Last night it was a little slower than the night before. They have 2,000 national guardsmen providing security for facilities and emergency services.
  - **Captain Meadows** stated that there was a lot of information sharing with the MCAP. They kept their head above water. Locally they did social media monitoring and outreach with the

retail outlets with information shared if necessary. They also shared incidents of peaceful local demonstrations with local municipalities affected.

- **Director Turner** advised that apparently there is a move afoot by some national leaders to have a march in Washington DC to interrupt whatever events are going on in DC. Captain Meadows stated that no notice was sent out to fusion centers yet.
- **Secretary Schiliro** shared that he felt looking at the MD National Guard that they deployed fairly-quickly with them being on scene within 8 hours. **LTC Showell** advised that DNG started gathering information and personnel status in case they received any requests for assets. She stated that they received requests for non-lethal weapons trainers and equipment although they have not sent anything.
- **Ray Holcomb** inquired as to what the deputization process is in DE. Director Turner stated that every formal service adopted the EMAC National Mutual Aid System that is used both in state and out of state. He advised Ray that he will update him later on the process. Secretary Schiliro told members that when we reach out directly and do not go through EMAC that those employees are not covered. Director Turner advised that if we received a request to send fire and EMS equipment to Baltimore that DEMA would get the Governor to issue an executive order authorizing their deployment and certifying them as official.
- **Lt. Col. Monroe Hudson** requested Director Turner to coordinate a separate meeting with DSP and their Unions to work out a plan prior to an event to talk about EMAC. Director Turner stated that State of Delaware employees remain State of Delaware employees when they go someplace like Baltimore the MD AG would swear them in so that they would work under the MD Unions. They are automatically deemed COPT certified with full arrest powers.
- **Colonel Wingate** echoed Director Turner's position stating that he read over EMAC located in Title 20 of the Delaware State Code and that it is very clear about the transferability.

**Secretary Schiliro** turned the meeting over to Secretary Ed Kee for his briefing.

**Secretary Kee** provided members a briefing on the Delmarva poultry industry as it relates to the recent avian influenza heading east across the country.

**Secretary Kee** stated that Sussex County leads in poultry production with 2,500 poultry farms in Sussex alone. That total increases when you include poultry production on the Delmarva Peninsula to about 5,000. State lines are only there for official purposes due to the way this gets

moved. He advised that \$800 or \$900 million in income directly relates to poultry not to mention the farmers, truckers, feeders, etc.

- There are currently approximately 70 farms in the mid-west with confirmation of the H5N7 strain. However, this strain is not one that converts easily to humans. The closest place to Delaware with an outbreak is Ontario, Canada, which is actually closer to us than Detroit, MI. It is a virus with the theory that it is being transported within the wild fowl fly-way. Ontario is within the Eastern Fly-way.
- This strain of the virus is transported primarily within feces so if a human walks in the feces and then tracks that into any poultry house that is how an infection begins. Turkeys are more susceptible to this strain.
- The Department of Agriculture is taking this strain very seriously. Secretary Kee advised that the Delaware Department of Agriculture has tremendous cooperation between DE, MD and the USDA.
- **Secretary Kee** commended Ray Holcomb for alerting the Delaware Department of Agriculture to other potentials of the virus and connecting them with the Delaware Emergency Management Agency (DEMA) who is supplying them with a planner. He also thanked Ray for connecting them with the Delaware National Guard (DNG) for resource sharing if the Department of Agriculture has to depopulate as the DNG has the equipment to assist in accomplishing that.
- He advised that the likelihood of an outbreak diminishes greatly as we get into warmer weather; however, DE expects to deal with this virus at some point perhaps in the fall or winter.
- The University of Delaware (U of D) is planning a big poultry event on a farm in Sussex County with perhaps 2,000 to 3,000 attendees; however this event has been postponed right now due to the threat of this influenza.
- **Secretary Kee** shared with members that in Middletown, Delaware there is an egg facility that has 1.2 million hens at their locations. He added that this facility was very, very appreciative of a recent visit by Secretary Kee and Ray Holcomb and the fact that they were being so proactive.
- **Secretary Kee** stated that if we get into major depopulation, what Delaware does with those birds is a major composting effort.

- He assured members that Delaware's food supply is safe. The risk to humans is very low with this particular strain. The USDA is very on top of this with incredible research to understand the epidemiology of how this virus spreads.
- The food industry and specifically the poultry industry are very aware that this could open the door to agro-terrorism. Secretary Kee first saw presentations on agro-terrorism after 9/11. He stated that if agro-terrorism should occur on the Delmarva Peninsula it would wreak havoc.
- In 2004 Tommy Thompson U.S. Health Secretary stated that he could not understand why terrorists have not attacked our food supply because it is so easy to do.
- **Secretary Kee** spoke briefly about the definition of Agro-terrorism defining it as:
  - The use, or threatened use, of biological, chemical, or radiological agents against some component of agriculture in such a way as to adversely impact the agriculture industry.
  - The malicious use of plant or animal pathogens to cause disease in the agricultural sector. It may also take the form of hoaxes and threats intended to create public fear of such events.
- The Department of Agriculture would need help with quarantine as the quarantined area would consist of a 6-mile radius to confirm whether the virus is present in other farms. The U of D Testing lab in Georgetown has a quick turn-around for sampling and testing. Secretary Kee advised that surveillance is 100% for every bird and every flock before it leaves the farm to go to production.
- He assured members that the farmers would recognize if their chickens were coughing and the onsite poultry representative also reports to the poultry houses who would come out to pick up a couple of birds for testing. If confirmed by the tests, the State Vet would take action. The Department of Agriculture in coordination with the University of Delaware (U of D) sends samples to Ames, Iowa for confirmation. If confirmed it would trigger a response for that facility and the subsequent six-mile quarantine radius.
- **Secretary Kee** briefly spoke to the HSAC members about: "Who Are the Terrorists?"
  - Terrorists are classified as International terrorists, Economic opportunists, Domestic Terrorists, and Militant Animal Rights Activists.
  - **Secretary Kee** feels that Militant Animal Rights Activists are the group that causes the greatest concerns to the Agriculture industry in Delaware.

- He shared an event from February 2010 relating to the big snow storm that collapsed 10 poultry houses stating that during that same time PETA was riding up and down Route 13 looking to make an issue of something.
- **Ray Holcomb** stated that insider threats are the biggest threats to the industry. Secretary Kee stated that the lethality of this virus is very quick as by the end of two or three days a flock of 1.2 million could be decimated. Delaware's control strategy is to depopulate and destroy the birds.
- **Secretary Kee** addressed food importation in Delaware hypothesizing that The Port of Wilmington could be a venue for this.
- As far as who is involved in response, he feels that Delaware is in pretty-good shape. The state veterinarian Dr. Hirst has done a great job. The veterinary folks at Perdue have done a great job.
- **Secretary Kee** thanked Ray for reaching out and giving them the pathway on how to work with the various agencies needed. He stated that in Delaware, the Secretary of Agriculture has the authority to call for quarantines in coordination with the Governor. The Department of Agriculture has been through table top exercises on this issue.
- **Ray Holcomb** commended Diane Hainsworth for collecting the slides Secretary Kee used at a recent conference in Atlanta. Ray stated that this is an opportune moment to ask LTC. Showell and Director Jamie Turner about the email shared with them relating to Wisconsin. Ray also commended DEMA for providing the Department of Agriculture with 2 planners to help get their arms around this.

**LTC Showell** briefed that the state of Minnesota currently had 34 guardsmen placed on state active duty for compost observation, and decontamination of vehicles; and the state of Wisconsin currently had 14 guardsmen on state active duty for water transport support to turkey flock depopulation.

**Director Jamie Turner** stated that DEMA used the fire service for tractor drawn trailers with pumps to provide foam to depopulate the poultry houses. The DNG has only one 5,000 gallon trailer. It takes approximately 6,000 – 8,000 gallons of water to depopulate one chicken house.

- **Secretary Kee** stated that a poultry house that is 400 feet long containing 25,000 birds would need 8,000 gallons of water.
- **Allen Metheny** told members that a lot of fire companies have foam applicators right on their trucks.

- **Director Turner** inquired as to what the life span of this particular strain is, to which Secretary Kee responded that it is here until eradication. Director Turner asked if the ducks are spreading this disease across the country, if there is any way to eradicate it where it is being spread. Secretary Kee advised that there is no way to eradicate this virus in the open air. It is transported by anything that carries the virus in the feces. The H5N7 virus is different than other strains in that the virus doesn't last long in warm weather.

**Colonel Wingate** shared that in the past the position was that it was not going to happen here in Delaware.

- He advised that the concern was more about the chicks and the open air markets.
- **Secretary Kee** stated that open air markets are still on the radar screen since Delaware's 2004 outbreak came from the outdoor air market in Philadelphia. Since that outbreak every backyard farmer in Delaware must register their flock with the Department of Agriculture. Delaware State University (DSU) works with the Department of Agriculture as well and has a poultry specialist that specializes in backyard flocks. Perdue is converting some of their growers to organic flocks that have a choice to come outside and walk around which increases the vulnerability. If Delaware does get an outbreak, the commercial organic birds would be discontinued until the infection is cleaned up.

**Steve Blessing** from the Division of Public Health stated that they have been working on surveillance and contact tracing with the Department of Agriculture. There is a lot of commonality and media messaging. This disease as it is right now is not a human threat. He also shared that they are looking at other things that could come down the road in terms of agro-terrorism to ensure that the human health side is protected.

- **Secretary Kee** emphasized that it is very unlikely that this virus would enter the food chain. In the plants they have a wide range of inspections. When the bird is dead the virus dies very quickly after that.
- **Secretary Kee** told members that in January a big weeklong series is planned with farmers and Steve Blessing shared that on the health side they have a symposium planned in the fall.

**Secretary Schiliro** believes that one of the great benefits of this group is the idea that we meet as a group to imagine that these things can happen and to plan for their eventuality.

- **Secretary Schiliro** introduced the subject of UAVs stating that he, Gene Donaldson, Dwayne Day, Raymond Holcomb, and Sgt. Darren Lester met with Representative Mitchell who was interested in looking at UAV legislation. Secretary Schiliro proposed introducing

legislation this year to regulate UAVs in several areas; flying over or near large events; restricting them from flying over critical infrastructure; and restricting them from flying during first response activities. Rep Mitchell was very receptive to this. He stated that he would work on it and have the legislative council come up with a draft to introduce this session.

- **Secretary Schiliro** advised that there have been incidents with UAVs around the country including in Delaware that indicate the trend to regulation. He deferred to DAG Lisa Morris to brief members about Delaware's recent incident.
- **DAG Lisa Morris** shared that one Dover neighbor flew his drone over his neighbor's six foot fence with a go-pro camera attached to it to record the activities of the other neighbor's wife who happened to be in the backyard at the time. Her husband shot it down. This resulted in calling the police who recovered the drone, the recording and referred the case to the DOJ.
- **Secretary Schiliro** told members that we need to come to grips with this issue as initially we were waiting for the FAA to come in with regulations and that did not happen.
- **Ray Holcomb** stated that a lot of people are jumping the gun and pushing legislation out that may have to be recalled.
- **Dwayne Day** told members that the FAA came out with a proposed small UAS rule on February 18 with a 60 day comment period that ended April 24; however, they did not receive a lot of comments on it. This makes them think that it would go fairly-fast. He believes that within 16 to 24 months a final rule should be out to allow businesses to fly drones. The only stipulation right now as far as qualifications is that they go to an FAA center to take a written test. The two FAA designated facilities in Delaware are Delaware State University and Georgetown Airport.

**Director Jamie Turner** told members that the discipline leads will find out on Monday if they are sending out an information bulletin from the IAB approving UAVs on their authorized equipment list.

- Jamie advised that there are restrictions that FEMA's grant people put on it. The first restriction is that anyone applying must have an aviation unit in place with rules and regulations in place in addition to requiring approval by DEMA's grant analyst.
- **Dwayne Day** clarified that the restrictions apply to use of grant funds to purchase UAVs; however, if the funds could be raised some other way then disciplines could purchase UAVs without having to follow those rules.

- Secretary Kee advised that it has nothing to do with private fertilizer companies.

**Secretary Kee** feels that HSAC members need to have a serious discussion about how they want to handle the privacy issue with farmers. He told members that farming is naturally competitive and that farmers buying seed from one company would object to having a competitor fly over the farm. Additionally, HSAC members need to consider the terrorist issue. Secretary Kee advised members that the Agriculture industry is going to be a big part of this issue for the privacy side as well as the terrorist side.

**Secretary Schiliro** advised members that Wilmington's Police Department has a UAV although he is not familiar with how frequently they use it. Once UAS/UAVs are developed they are going to have tremendous use.

- A discussion ensued over how it is done now and how rules will apply in the future to UAVs as well as a registration process.
- **Secretary Kee** reiterated that agriculture is a very, very, competitive system.
- **Dwayne Day** advised members that the FAA has come out and stated that UAVs (drones) are aircraft and that it is against the law to shoot an aircraft.
- **Secretary Kee** advised that farmers are already dealing with theft of copper wire from irrigation units for \$200.00 and that he can see where some of the farmers would shoot down drones flying over farm property. He inquired as to what are farmers and individual's defensive measure against drones. Secretary Kee feels strongly that somehow a subset of this Council needs to sit down with agriculture personnel sometime in July or August after the planting season winds down.
- **Dwayne Day** advised Secretary Kee that they will have to sit down with Secretary Schiliro and Ray Holcomb to discuss the focus and the narrowness of its focus.
- **Secretary Schiliro** told members that if we do get it passed we are going to have to deal with counter measures.
- **Gene Donaldson** asked Dwayne Day to draft a memo to DelDOT Secretary Jennifer Cohen as to what the roles of our agencies are since aeronautics falls under DelDOT responsibility.
- Ed Klima from Dover Motorsports advised that they are coming to sporting events especially when considering the costs of helicopters vs a drones to cover different events. He recommended engaging some of those partners who are building them and using them overseas in a commercial aspect to get them involved sooner rather than later.

- A discussion ensued relating to recent international UAV incidents including a UAV that landed on the Japanese Prime Minister's roof this weekend and the April 22 incident in South Carolina involving a drone that tried to drop contraband in a correctional facility.

**Lt. Col. Hudson** briefed members on Active Shooter Training advising them that a Statewide Policy went to the Delaware Police Chiefs' Council which approved it as a standard policy for any law-enforcement agencies reacting to an active shooter response.

- DSP trainers are holding two trainings per month until all law-enforcement in Delaware are trained on the same exact law-enforcement protocol whether they are state law-enforcement or local law-enforcement.
- **Secretary Schiliro** advised members that we are falling a little short on devoting effort to the civilian employees, and larger industrial facilities for training on active shooters.
- **Allen Metheny** inquired as to where the fire service and EMS stand on this training. Lt. Col. Hudson told Mr. Metheny and council members that the Delaware Police Chiefs' Council has discussion on this topic; although there are still some companies that want to take medics into a hot zone. He advised that the status depends on which county you are speaking of. Lt. Col. Hudson personally met with New Castle County.

**Director Scott Vien** updated members on DMVs facial recognition technology telling everyone that DMV still has some fine tuning to do. Director Vien feels that Delaware will more than likely develop some fraud cases because of this technology.

**Steve Blessing** told members that DHSS/DPH received 3 supplemental grants with specific requirements to build out lab capacity to enable work on other agencies with other issues including quarantine, patient care, referral patterns for patients, and what hospitals need to do to treat patients in the short term.

- Steve stated that they are specific to Ebola although there is a lot of benefit coming from it for other areas.
- This past flu season was very bad with 22 Delaware fatalities from the flu. There is a lot of concern moving forward for next year to get individuals vaccinated and they are already working on pushing media out to communicate the importance of vaccination to vulnerable groups.
- He told members that the Division of Public Health just finished a 5 year cycle with the national stockpile receiving medications and dispensing medications to the general populations. He shared that overall they are in pretty-good shape.

**Director Jamie Turner** briefed members on the status of grants.

- Director Turner advised that Allen and his group will be meeting Monday, May 4 to finalize Delaware's submittal to the Homeland Security Grant Program (HSGP). He feels that it is pretty-apparent that we are going to maintain and sustain funding for equipment and exercises.
- The Emergency Management Performance Grant (EMPG) is finished and was submitted last week.
- Director Turner told Secretary Kee that DEMA has two planners working with the Department of Agriculture. DEMA is also trying to upgrade Delaware's agro-terrorism funding in order to supplement our HSGP.
- DEMA recently finished their Radiological Emergency Preparedness (REP) Potassium Iodide (KI) distribution with over 500 families receiving the tablets. He believes that this is because there is a lot of concern about the nuclear plant and the push to get the Nuclear Regulatory Commission (NRC) to expand the zone.
- Director Turner stated that he will be working with DAG Lisa Morris on applications for the State of Emergency (SOE) waivers and that he needs to update the Frequently Asked Questions (FAQs) prior to Secretary Schiliro approving.

**Gene Donaldson** told members that DeIDOT is about to enter the big event of the race season stating that Ray is going to speak to members about ISIS related graffiti.

- Ray Holcomb deferred it to Dwayne to speak about ISIS graffiti and tagging.
- Dwayne briefed members on the development of a laminated visor card that has the information for drivers to pay attention to and report. DeIDOT wants to put them in the majority of the DeIDOT trucks and with Delaware State Police vehicles to give them an idea of what they are looking for and how to deal with it.
- Gene Donaldson told members that Dwayne Day met with DeIDOT sign people to brief them.

**Ray Holcomb** commended the response that he received in response to the avian influenza concern. He advised that when this issue was discussed with the Department of Agriculture and

he reached out to DEMA and the Division of Public Health about the concern over this virus he was impressed with how well everyone came together immediately.
