**1. WELCOME & CALL TO ORDER**

At approximately 10:14 A.M., Chairman Patterson called the meeting to order.

**2. APPROVAL OF MINUTES (JANUARY 11, 2017 DTRC MEETING)**

Before the approval of the minutes, Chairman Patterson welcomed the new Secretary of Agriculture, Secretary Michael Scuse. Secretary Scuse said it was a pleasure to be back to Delaware. Upon a motion duly made (Decker) and seconded (Stegemeier) the minutes for January 11, 2017 were approved.

### 3. OLD BUSINESS

#### A. Adoption of ARCI Model Rules and Modifications to the Multiple Medication Violation System

Mr. Andrew Kerber relayed that on March 1, 2017 he had published the proposed changes to Rules 14.19.1 (Multiple Disqualifications), 14.20 (Dead Heats), and to Rule 15 which adds the new ARCI Veterinary Practices Rule, ARCI Prohibited Practices Rule, and the ARCI Out of Competition Rule.

The proposal for Rule 14.19.1 states:

(14.19.1) "Should the stewards determine that there is more than one incident of the interference in a race where the disqualification is warranted, the stewards shall deal with the incidents in the order in which the incident occurs during the race from start to finish; except in the case where the same horses are involved in multiple incidents. Once a horse has been disqualified, it should remain placed behind the horse with which it interfered."

The proposal for Rule 14.20 states:

(14.20.1) "When two horses run a dead heat for first place, all purses or prizes to which first and second horses would have been entitled shall be divided equally between them; and this applies in dividing all purses or prizes whatever the number of horses running a dead heat and whatever places for which the dead heat is run."

(14.20.2) "In a dead heat for first place, each horse involved shall be deemed a winner and liable to penalty for the amount it shall receive."

(14.20.3) "When a dead heat is run for second place and objection is made to the winner of the race, and sustained, the horses which ran a dead heat shall be deemed to have run a dead heat for first place."

(14.20.4) "If the dividing owners cannot agree as to which of them is to have a cup or other prize which cannot be divided, the question shall be determined by lot by the stewards."

The proposal for 15.22 (ARCI Veterinary Practices Rule) states:

(15.22.1) "The Commission hereby adopts by reference the Association of Racing Commissioners International Veterinary Practices rule (ARCI-011-010, Model Rules v7.0, 2017). If there is any inconsistency between the Commission's regulations and the ARCI Practices rule, the provisions of the Commission's regulations shall prevail."

The proposal for 15.23 (ARCI Prohibited Practices Rule) states:

(15.23.1) "The Commission hereby adopts by reference the Association of Racing Commissioners International Prohibited Practices rule including Annex I Prohibited Substances (ARCI-011-015, Model Rules v7.0, January 2017). If there is any inconsistency between the Commission's regulations and the ARCI Prohibited Practices rule, the provisions of the Commission's regulations shall prevail."

The proposal for 15.24 (ARCI Out of Competition Rule) states:

(15.24.1) "The Commission hereby adopts by reference of the Association of Racing Commissioners International Out of Competition Testing Rule (ARCI-022-010, Model Rules v7.0, 2017). If there is any inconsistency between the Commission's regulations and the ARCI Out of Competition Testing rule, the provisions of the Commissioner's regulation shall prevail."

#### B. Proposed Change to Rule 15.17.1.1 (Removal of Medication "Stanozolol" from Rule)

On March 1, 2017, Mr. Kerber published a proposal to remove the anabolic steroid, Stanozolol, from Rule 15.17.1.1.

All of the above proposals are in a 30-day comment period. Mr. Kerber asked Mr. Wayne if any comments have been received regarding these Rule changes, to which Mr. Wayne replied that there have been none. The Commission will be able to vote on these Rule Changes at the next Commission Meeting in April and these Rules should be in place for the 2017 meet at Delaware Park if there are no further comments.

Chairman Patterson relayed to Secretary Scuse that the modifications to the Multiple Medication Violation System had already been approved at the ARCI meeting in Tucson, Arizona. He said that some states did not approve these modifications but ARCI is currently striving to reach uniformity in racing regulation among the states.

#### **4. NEW BUSINESS**

##### **A. Joint Finance Committee Hearing Report and Information**

Executive Director Mr. John Wayne said that the Joint Finance Committee Hearing was cancelled. However he had previously prepared a report for Secretary Scuse to give at the meeting, which was then given to the Commissioners and published online. Mr. Wayne also provided the 2016 Annual Report, included in the Commissioners' packets.

Secretary Scuse further said the Joint Finance Committee Hearing was cancelled because the Committee had been running behind, and he is unsure as to whether the Hearing will be rescheduled.

Before moving on to Mr. Wayne's Summary of Activities Report, Chairman Patterson explained to the Commission that there is currently the start of a movement to have a compact as a first step to try to have uniformity in racing. 90% of the jurisdictions have adopted the Uniform Medication Program. Only 40% have adopted the Multiple Medication Violation System, but since the modifications made the system, it is anticipated that there will be higher involvement in the future. 70% of jurisdictions allow third party medication and 31 of the 34 jurisdictions have accredited laboratories. There are great strides being made towards uniformity, however proponents of USADA legislation feel that more is still left to be done.

Commissioner Levine mentioned a circulation of model language that was sent to Mr. Kerber regarding interstate compacts. Mr. Kerber confirmed that he reviewed this and said he had no doubt that the Executive Director would have the power to be able to enter into the compact with the consent of the Commission, following a vote. Chairman Patterson stated further that many modifications will also be made before the Commission does this, and that this legislation is an outgrowth of legislation initially made with an opt-out provision and had no teeth to it.

Chairman Patterson also referenced the ARCI meeting in Tucson where it was discussed that the Standardbreds will be introducing their own compact as well as Quarter Horses.

Commissioner Stegemeier asked Chairman Patterson for an update on the Jockey Club's effort to have legislation tasks over racing. Chairman Patterson answered that the Jockey Club is not backing off from this issue and that he met with Jim Gagliano, President of the Jockey Club, where they discussed USADA legislation. Chairman Patterson told Mr. Gagliano that USADA having some involvement as a consultant would be beneficial because USADA has a positive perception in horseracing but to have USADA oversee the industry itself is not something that Chairman Patterson would support. Chairman Patterson also referenced the Leadership Meeting in Tucson, Arizona which involved all the representatives from organizations such as the Quarter Horse Association, Standardbred Association, and TRA (Thoroughbred Racing Association), and Chairman Patterson also noted that TRA wouldn't be in business much longer. One of the proposals made at this meeting was to have a review among these organizations to see how compliant they are and how they run their businesses.

Delaware Park President William Fasy, who sits on the TRA board, referenced Chairman Patterson's comment about TRA closing down, and asked Chairman Patterson to elaborate.

Chairman Patterson explained that he was contacted to look at the TRA space in Fair Hill, Maryland which is still leased to the state of Maryland and can only be leased to an entity that has equine affiliation. Mr. Fasy answered that TRA and TRPB were going to own this space in January. They are going to be leasing out space as part of a strategic plan due to changes in staffing. Many racetracks in the country still strongly support the TRA. Chairman Patterson explained that he was just contacted to look at the space to see what it could be rented for and he also discovered that the TRA is moving to Lexington, Kentucky. Mr. Fasy said he was unaware of this move.

## 5. REPORT FROM DTRC EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Mr. Wayne presented his Summary of Activities Report for January, 2017. At the next Commission meeting he will present his February and March Summaries together as he has in previous years.

After reviewing these statistics with the Commission, Mr. Wayne relayed that in January there were two major fines collected that were delinquent and went unpaid for several years. They paid penalty and interest, and that interest increased by 1.5% every month that they went unpaid.

Commissioner Stegemeier asked Mr. Wayne how he would rate Truesdail's testing performance. Mr. Wayne replied that Truesdail does an excellent job. He also referenced Dr. Fontana's presentation to the Commission in 2016 when he came to Delaware Park to discuss testing procedures. Mr. Wayne also noted that Truesdail has very quick response times and has always been very effective in working with the Commission. He has nothing bad to say about the laboratory. Mr. Wayne mentioned that out of competition testing makes up for 11.6% of all of Delaware's testing and that Delaware is one of the leading jurisdictions in out of competition testing.

At this time, Commissioner Decker made note that \$322,000 was bet on harness racing at Delaware Park, which is far more than the amount that was bet on thoroughbred racing, which he found interesting. He also requested an update from Mr. Fasy regarding where Delaware stands on exchange wagering. Mr. Fasy said that this decision is pending approval from the Horsemen's Association. Executive Director of the DTHA, Bessie Gruwell, stated that at the last DTHA meeting discussing this, they wanted to find out which other Mid-Atlantic states would be taking place in this. To their finding, New Jersey was indifferent about whether Delaware joined in exchange wagering and no other states in this region were interested in joining in either, other than New Jersey. There has not yet been another meeting to discuss it further but there will be one taking place on March 21, 2017. Mr. Fasy said that to his understanding, though there aren't any other Mid Atlantic tracks interested in taking place in exchange wagering, there are many other states nationwide that are benefitting from it. He explained that Betfair offered to come to the last DTHA meeting but there was misunderstanding about what the benefits of exchange wagering are. Commissioner Killeen suggested that Ms. Gruwell get in touch with representatives from states where Betfair is doing well, so they could discuss the benefits of exchange wagering. Chairman Patterson reiterated that without new bettors, Delaware will continue to decline in wagering and Betfair seems like a promising way to engage a new group of bettors. He also stated again that he believes the decision made by the DTHA at their initial meeting about this was very short sighted. Ms. Gruwell said she will bring this issue back up at their next meeting.

Mr. Fasy said that he was currently putting together a draft bill for the Governor to allow ADW (advance deposit wagering), and with the Governor's approval, he would distribute the bill to the Commission and the Horsemen to comment on it for their approval. He believes the DTHA will support this bill and he is trying to draft the bill so that it supports everyone's angles and meets their needs and concerns. Mr. Fasy noted that Delaware is the only jurisdiction in the region and one of the only ones in the nation who are not already doing ADW.

Commissioner Decker asked Mr. Kerber to confirm that Delaware could do exchange wagering as long as it was limited to Delawareans. Mr. Kerber answered that at this time, Delawareans can only bet on the racetrack grounds. ADW would make it so that Delawareans could bet anywhere in the state of Delaware using geo-location. As far as exchange wagering, all that Delaware can approve (under existing law) is for New Jersey to use Delaware's signal to accept Delaware bets in the state of New Jersey, and those bets can *only* be made by New Jersey residents. Ms. Gruwell explained that though DTHA and the Commission have not come to a consensus on exchange wagering at this time, DTHA has always supported ADW for many years. Ms. Gruwell said that not all of the DTHA members will be present for the March DTHA meeting, but they can instead meet with Betfair in April when the most DTHA members will be present. Mr. Fasy reminded Ms. Gruwell that Betfair offered just a trial, and if Delaware is not happy with it they don't have to continue with it.

Mr. Wayne went on to discuss his meeting in Tampa Bay Downs at the ORI (Organization of Racing Investigators) 2017 Conference. There were 65 attendees present at the meeting. Mr. Wayne was asked to be Vice Chairman of the ORI in 2018 but he declined the offer because, as a previous member of the board already, he wanted to give someone else a chance. Mr. Jim Blodgett, Director of Enforcement of the Texas Racing Commission, was

chosen to be Vice Chairman and Jeremy Locke was elected Chairman. The next ORI meeting will be in Toronto, Ontario, and the following one will be in Florida at Gulfstream Park. Mr. Wayne was appointed Communications person for ORI and Mr. Wayne said he would do whatever he could to help.

Mr. Wayne then discussed the upcoming March meeting for Mid-Atlantic Medication, hosted by Alan Foreman at White Clay Creek Country Club from 10:00 AM to 4:00 PM. Mr. Foreman has been a big proponent in getting the Mid-Atlantic to lead the nation in its effort to reach reform and uniformity.

Mr. Wayne was also invited to speak at the Investigators Round Table at Penn National on March 30-31<sup>st</sup>. He is unsure if he will have the time to do it based on the fact that the ROAP Meeting will take place just a few days after. Chairman Patterson explained to Secretary Scuse that ROAP stands for Racing Officials Accreditation Program, which is a continuing education class for stewards that Mr. Wayne has hosted at Delaware for a number of years.

The University of Arizona has also invited Mr. Wayne to travel to Arizona, at their expense, to teach a class about the racetrack industry. He said he is unsure about attending this as well due to the timing of it, but told the Commission that he would use his leave to take off for this class if he did decide to go. He would also like to check with the Commission for approval.

Commissioner Decker asked Mr. Wayne why he felt the need to take his annual leave to go to Arizona. Mr. Wayne's presence at the national scene is beneficial to the Commission. Mr. Wayne said he accumulates a lot of annual leave during the course of the year and he did not see it fair to leave Delaware to attend other affairs. Secretary Scuse told Mr. Wayne not to take annual leave for his trip to Arizona because he is not being compensated for it.

## **6. REPORT FROM DTRC CHIEF COMMISSION VETERINARIAN-HEALTH REPORT AND INFORMATION**

Chairman Patterson announced that Dr. Susan Botts would be returning as the Delaware Commission head veterinarian in 2017. At the end of 2016, the Commission met with Dr. Pastir and she seemed like a good candidate for a fill-in vet. Mr. Wayne also spoke with Dr. Picciano, who is employed by New Jersey Racing Commission full time. However, since racing days are diminishing in New Jersey, Mr. Wayne thinks that she would make a good candidate for a fill-in veterinarian in Delaware as well. Mr. Wayne also indicated that Dr. Susan Bennett, who Mr. Wayne has previously worked with in Atlantic City, is interested in substituting too. There are 3 positions available that Mr. Wayne wants to fill with full-time vets to take some of the strain off of Dr. Botts. Commissioner Stegemeier spoke with Dr. Richard Brown, who said that he would be happy to fill in whenever he is available as well.

There were issues that took place last year with the 29<sup>3/4</sup> hour rule in place. Commissioner Stegemeier asked Secretary Scuse if the dismantlement of Obamacare will change that rule. Secretary Scuse said that until the decision is finalized, nothing will change in regards to the number of hours allowed to work.

Commissioner Decker explained to Secretary Scuse that filling veterinary jobs has been a problem for the Commission in the past, even though there was also an increase in their pay about a year ago. Chairman Patterson said this is a problem almost everywhere. For example, some jurisdictions have so few vets that they do not have a third party medication law in place because there are not enough vets to handle it. The other problem is that there are so many tracks racing at once and some vets are even out of work in the winter.

## **7. REPORT FROM DELAWARE THOROUGHBRED HORSEMEN'S ASSOCIATION**

### **A. Delaware Certified Thoroughbred Program's Report**

Ms. Bessie Gruwell presented the statistics for the Delaware Certified Thoroughbred Program. There was a major influx of Delaware Certified horses in the month of December with 93 yearlings in the program bringing the 2016 total to 225, and Ms. Gruwell announced that 11 Delaware Certified applications have already been received for the first quarter of 2017. The total payout for 2016 was \$698,816.24 and the current balance in the Delaware Certified Special Account is \$1,309,401.14. In 2016, there were 204 Delaware Certified Starters, 631 Starts, 73 firsts, 86 seconds, and 93 thirds. Ms. Gruwell said they will be spending the 25% bonuses through the bonus program and they have enhanced the bonuses given out on Owners Day. The two older Delaware Certified races have increased from \$75,000 to \$100,000. The two open stakes that run on Owners Day, the George Rosenburger Memorial Race and the DTHA Governors' Race, will have an additional \$50,000 added to the purse if a Delaware Certified horse runs 1<sup>st</sup>, 2<sup>nd</sup>, or 3<sup>rd</sup>. Any horse that wins an open stakes race at Delaware Park also now has a purse increase of \$2,500, from \$7,500 to \$10,000. Ms. Gruwell said that these changes serve as an incentive to increase interest in the Delaware Certified Thoroughbred Program and they have been added to the Condition Book. There is also to be an advertisement placed in the next issue of Mid-Atlantic Thoroughbred magazine featuring these changes. Ms. Gruwell then went on to explain that though some of the bigger Certifiers have left the program, there have also been many new Certifiers as well. Ms. Gruwell also reported that DTHA met with the insurance commissioner to discuss Workmens' Compensation and they had a great meeting, discussing different safety protocols that they could possibly have in place, and if the DTHA works together with the insurance commissioner, they may anticipate an 18-20% decrease in insurance rates. Delaware Park already meets a lot of the safety measures and with other measures in place (for example, with the addition of a safety steward), Ms. Gruwell anticipates that there will be a considerable discount in rates for many of the trainers.

## **8. PUBLIC COMMENT**

Mr. John Mooney stated that the stable area opened on March 1, 2017. There are 66 horses currently in the backside and in the middle of the month they are expecting more to come in. Trainer Larry Jones has shipped some from New Orleans,

including I'm A Chatterbox, winner of the 2016 Delaware Handicap. Chairman Patterson asked Mr. Mooney if he had a successful tour of southern tracks to attract both old and new customers. Mr. Mooney answered that he met with a number of people who express interest in coming to Delaware, and he is anticipating as many if not more horses stabled in Delaware as there were in 2016. Chairman Patterson asked Mr. Mooney what he believes the future holds for New Jersey. Mr. Mooney answered that he is not sure. Commissioner Decker asked, that since Delaware law allows 100 days of live racing, if Delaware Park would possibly add more racing days to the end of the 81 approved days, due to the success in the fall of the 2016 meet. Mr. Mooney answered that they would probably not, because in the fall Delaware Park is very dependent on turf racing and they were fortunate to be on the turf until the end of the meet last year. He anticipates that in the middle of October, the track will probably be back on dirt only which will start to drive customers elsewhere. Chairman Patterson asked if trainer Gerald Bennett will be returning to Delaware this year. Mr. Mooney answered that Mr. Bennett is still undecided, but he guesses not.

## **9. EXECUTIVE SESSION**

Upon a motion duly made (Decker) and seconded (Levine), public session was moved to executive session at approximately 11:14 P.M., which took place in the Administrative Office.

## **10. ADJOURNMENT**

Upon a motion duly made (Decker) and seconded (Levine) executive session was moved back to public session. Public session was adjourned at approximately 2:15 P.M.
