1. WELCOME & CALL TO ORDER

At approximately 10:10 A.M., Chairman Duncan Patterson called the meeting to order.

2. APPROVAL OF MINUTES (AUGUST 17, 2017 MEETING)

Upon a motion duly made (Decker) and seconded (Stegemeier), the minutes from the August 17, 2017 Commission meeting were approved. The vote was unanimous.

Before moving on to the public hearings on appeal, Chairman Patterson first wanted to congratulate Commissioner Henry J. Decker on being appointed to the Delaware River & Bay Authority.

3. PUBLIC HEARING ON APPEAL

A. Mr. Jeffrey Trosclair- Appeal Protest Race 8.12.17 Disqualification of LANGDARMA in Race 8 on August 12, 2017

At this time, Deputy Attorney General Andrew Kerber called upon Mr. Jeffrey Trosclair. Mr. Trosclair was appealing the disqualification of his horse, LANGDARMA in Race 8 on August 12, 2017. Verbatim testimony was recorded by the court reporter.

At the conclusion of testimony and following the Commission's public deliberations, Commissioner-Secretary Edward Stegemeier moved to uphold the Stewards' disqualification of LANGDARMA in Race 8 on August 12, 2017. Commissioner Levine seconded. The vote was unanimous.

B. Mr. Randy Nunley-Appeal of Stewards Ruling 57-2017 90 Day Suspension and \$2,500 fine (Violation of Claiming Rules) DTRC Rule Number(s): 2.5.1, 2.5.1.18, 2.5.1.20, 3.3, 3.4, 3.4.1.1, 3.4.1.3, 3.4.1.4, 3.4.15, 13.7, 18.1, 18.1.1, and 18.1.3

At this time, Deputy Attorney General Andrew Kerber called upon Mr. Randy Nunley. Mr. Nunley was appealing the Stewards' Ruling 57-2017. The penalty for this ruling was a 90 day suspension and a \$2,500 fine, in violation of DTRC rules 2.5.1, 2.5.1.18, 2.5.1.20, 3.3, 3.4, 3.4.1.1, 3.4.1.3, 3.4.1.4, 3.4.15, 13.7, 18.1, 18.1.1, and 18.1.3. Before testimony commenced, Mr. Kerber notified the Commission that Mr. Giangiulio was going to be representing Mr. Nunley Pro Hac Vice with approval from both the Commission and Supreme Court. He is a member of the Pennsylvania Bar. Verbatim testimony was taken by the court reporter.

At the conclusion of testimony and following the Commission's public deliberations, Commissioner Richard Levine made a motion to overturn the decisions of the Stewards' Ruling 57-2017. Commissioner-Secretary Stegemeier seconded. The vote was unanimous.

4. DECISION AND ORDER SIGNING BY THE COMMISSION REGARDING APPEAL OF STEWARDS RULING 39-2017-7 DAY SUSPENSION (CARELESS RIDING) DTRC RULE NUMBER(S): 3.3 AND 14.16

At this time, Mr. Kerber presented a decision and order that he had prepared for the Commissioners to sign. Each Commissioner with the exception of Commissioner Killeen, who was not present at the meeting, signed this.

5. OLD BUSINESS

A. ARCI v 8.1 RULE CHANGE UPDATE

Upon a motion duly made (Decker) and seconded (Stegemeier), the ARCI v 8.1 rule change update will be discussed at the upcoming October DTRC meeting. The vote was unanimous.

6. NEW BUSINESS

A. 2017 RMTc EXTERNAL QUALITY ASSURANCE PROGRAM (EQAP RESULTS) REPORT FROM DTRC EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Upon a motion duly made (Decker) and seconded (Stegemeier), the 2017 RMTc External Quality Assurance (EQAP) results report will be discussed at the upcoming October DTRC meeting. The vote was unanimous.

B. POST TIME POKER- ERIC PULLMAN

At this time, Eric Pullman, Founder of Post Time Poker, gave a presentation. He thanked the Commission for giving him the opportunity to speak and Mr. John Wayne for facilitating the presentation. He introduced Bruce Benedict, consultant of Post Time Poker. Mr. Pullman related that he and Mr. Benedict are with the Pari-Mutuel Gaming Network Corporation.

Mr. Pullman continued that in the mid-2000s, the industry was experiencing a severe handle decline with the advent of online poker. After this, Mr. Pullman created the world's only live dealer Hold'em poker game presented as a pari-mutuel event. Mr. Pullman said that this game brings total transparency and new players into pari-mutuel facilities.

Mr. Pullman demonstrated how the game is played. Real cards are played open-faced on table simulcast for wagering by remote players. Players may place pari-mutuel wagers in the same way as if betting on a horse race. There are 6 ten minute games per hour and the game is broadcast via Internet.

Post Time Poker has been live in the state of Nebraska since early July 2017, operating as a skill game under the "Dominant Factor" rule which states that if a game is more of a game of skill than chance, it is not considered gambling. There are 39 states that employ the "Dominant Factor." Delaware is a gray area as it relates to the "dominant factor" and that this game is predominantly skill, not chance.

Commissioner Levine asked how this was relevant to horse racing. Mr. Pullman answered that one of the benefits of Post Time Poker is that in any jurisdiction that they take wagers, they give back to racetracks for purse enhancements. They also think that Post Time Poker would help attract a new tier of player and introduce them to the benefits of pari-mutuel gaming. Wagers are placed through an AmTote or a Sportech machine similar to any other type of betting.

Chairman Patterson asked Mr. Pullman if they had discussed this with Delaware Park yet. Mr. Pullman said that they have not done a presentation at Delaware Park, but they had been in discussion with them. Chairman Patterson asked Mr. Kevin DeLucia if this is something Delaware Park would be interested in. Mr. DeLucia answered that they are, but that they have to defer on it until it has been determined to be in compliance with Delaware law and pending approval from the Commission. Mr. Kerber agreed.

Mr. Pullman said that the game provides an exciting new opportunity for young people to be introduced to pari-mutuel wagering. Chairman Patterson said that this is something the Commission could be in support of.

Ms. Bessie Gruwell asked if the game is played like Keno, and if everyone can see the same hand on the screen. Mr. Pullman replied that it was similar to Keno in that everyone can see the same hand onscreen at all times. Mr. Pullman did a walkthrough of the game to show the Commissioners how it was played.

Mr. Bruce Benedict also added that the game is compliant with ARCI model rules and regulations. Mr. Pullman said that the odds come from the pools just like in horse racing. The game is extremely social and can be played for a long time with not having to wait too long between games unlike in horse racing.

Mr. Kerber informed Mr. Pullman that the Commission and Delaware Park will have to determine whether the game would be legal in Delaware and in compliance with the Delaware Code. Mr. Kerber asked Mr. Pullman to have his legal counsel contact him directly for discussion.

Mr. Pullman ended his presentation by saying that a live feed of the game can be viewed at post-time-poker.com and he thanked the Commission for their time.

At this point in the meeting Commissioner Decker noted a new rule in Pennsylvania regarding horse positives. After certain positives, horses are barred for 90 days. Commissioner Decker moved that this become a discussion topic at the October Commission meeting.

Mr. Wayne reported that the dates for the 2018 ROAP meeting have been tentatively set to April 16 and 17, 2018, and will take place at the White Clay Creek Country Club.

Mr. Wayne also reported that on September 12th, the jockeys' annual visit to Neumour's Alfred I. duPont Hospital took place. There were 6 riders who attended as well as Mr. Wayne, Bobby Colton, Reese Howard, Chris Sobicinski, and valet Gabriel Castro. The Jockeys Guild, Delaware Park, and the Delaware Horsemen's Association provided gifts to give to the children in the hospital. The rider participants were Trevor McCarthy, Ashley Castrenze, Katie Davis, Wallynette Rodriguez, Keiber Coa, and Jose Bracho. Mr. Wayne reported that the riders participated in many fun activities with the children and brought much joy to the families. A copy of the press release is attached to the minutes as reference.

7. REPORT FROM DTRC CHIEF COMMISSION VETERINARIAN-HEALTH REPORT AND INFORMATION

Commissioner Stegemeier noted that he was alarmed at the number of mortalities on the report. Chairman Patterson agreed.

Dr. Botts reported that August was not a good month regarding breakdowns. Chairman Patterson asked her if she saw anything consistent with the breakdowns that she could identify. Dr. Botts said that she did not. Three breakdowns took place on the turf and two were on the dirt. There were two horses that were elected euthanasia. Referencing one of the horses' injuries, Chairman Patterson asked Dr. Botts if its soft-tissue injury was sufficient enough to warrant the euthanasia. Dr. Botts answered that she was not there when it happened so she was not sure. Chairman Patterson said he has a problem with this. There was also another elected euthanasia for a horse with a sub-chondral cyst.

Commissioner Decker asked Dr. Botts about the method of calculations of racing injuries and deaths. Dr. Botts answered that the number of fatalities is put into the number of starts, and then multiplied by 1,000. Commissioner Stegemeier noted that August showed 5 fatalities out of 1,000 starts, which is extremely high.

Chairman Patterson asked Dr. Botts if there was a difference in injuries or deaths between horses that are stabled at Delaware Park and horses that are shipped in. Dr. Botts said that about half of the breakdowns were horses that were on the grounds and the other half were horses that were shipped in but she could not say for sure if there were any major differences.

Commissioner Decker asked who elects the euthanasia. Dr. Botts answered that the owner or trainer does, with the help of their veterinarian.

Dr. Botts said that the high amount of breakdowns may be contributed to a number of things. One of the things is that the stock is not as good as it has been in previous years. There is a difference in the quality of horses.

Commissioner Decker asked if Dr. Botts believed any of the horses were training through pain. Dr. Botts said that any horses that are painful or lame in the morning would be scratched.

Commissioner Decker said that the track is in good shape, and Dr. Botts agreed. Chairman Patterson said that he had not heard of any complaints in a long time about the track and that the track had been mostly consistent.

Dr. Botts said horses have had to come back and race a lot more frequently than they have in the past. Dr. Botts said that there have been no Arabian breakdowns this year but they are looking "rough", compared to the previous year.

Chairman Patterson noted that Saratoga has had problems this year as well. Dr. Botts said that most of the surrounding tracks are experiencing problems, especially with less horses bred each year. Older horses (9-10 years old) are racing more often.

Chairman Patterson reaffirmed that the Commission will continue doing the best they can to ensure safety and good veterinary practices.

8. REPORT FROM DELAWARE THOROUGHBRED HORSEMEN'S ASSOCIATION

A. Delaware Certified Thoroughbred Program's Report

At this time, Ms. Bessie Gruwell presented the Delaware Certified Thoroughbred Program's report. Through September, 21 total applications were received bringing the number of year-to-date applications to 62 (4 weanlings and 58 yearlings). On October 2-3, Fasig-Tipton will host their yearling sale. There are 30 Delaware Certified horses that will be in that sale. Generally, after the sale is over, many horses do come into the program. In 2017 so far, there have been 155 Delaware Certified horses starting 359 times with 50 firsts, 38 seconds, and 46 thirds. The program has paid out \$438,705.00. The balance of the Special Account is currently at \$872,630.05. Per Commissioner Levine's suggestion at the August Commission meeting, Ms. Gruwell researched Capital One and Discover Banks for a different interest rate. She found that the interest rates are good at 1% for 1 year, and then go back down.

Ms. Gruwell also explained that Owners Day is on September 30th and invited the Commissioners. There will be four Delaware Certified Stakes that day. They added a \$50,000 bonus on to the other two Open Delaware Certified Stakes. These bonuses serve as an incentive to run in Open Stakes and to enter into the program. Ms. Gruwell thanked the Commission for their time.

9. PUBLIC COMMENT

There was no public comment at this time.

10. EXECUTIVE SESSION

Upon a motion duly made (Decker) and seconded (Stegemeier), public session was moved to executive session at the Delaware Park administrative office at approximately 1:50. Mr. Kerber indicated that there would be no Public Session following Executive Session.

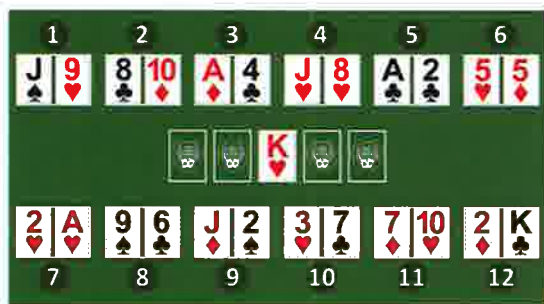
OVERVIEW

Post Time Poker is a one of a kind Texas Hold'em game, where instead of simply playing the hand you're dealt, you get to choose which hand (or hands) you'd like to play!

In our secure gaming facility, Post Time Poker is dealt by real people, using real cards, onto a real table. We use a standard shuffle machine and shoe to ensure random deals every time. The game is broadcast live and simulcast worldwide, which means that an unlimited number of players are able to participate. This broad player base, combined with several "carryover" wagers, can generate huge pools, with the possibility of longshot payoffs.

GAME PLAY

Each game opens with 12 two-card Texas Hold'em hands being dealt face up, followed by the center card of a five-card FLOP hand also dealt face up. The deal takes between 60 and 90 seconds, and shown below is a sample table layout as wagering begins:



The wagering period continues for approximately four minutes. Odds and payoffs are refreshed regularly. Once the

wagering period closes, the final four FLOP cards are dealt into their respective positions, and the deal is concluded. Then the hands are ranked using standard poker scoring, and official results are posted.

PARI-MUTUEL

Post Time Poker is patented in over 60 countries, being the first and only poker game to use pari-mutuel wagering. Pari-mutuel is a wagering system in which bettors wager against each other and not against the house, and all wagers of a particular type are placed together into a common pool. Payoff odds are calculated by sharing each pool among all winning wagers. Hands that receive the most wagers will generate relatively lower odds and payoffs. There will be an opposite effect on hands that receive the fewest wagers, since they will have the highest odds and the greatest payoffs.

STANDARD WAGERS

WIN: You must pick the hand that is ranked 1st.

PLACE: Your chosen hand must rank either 1st or 2nd.

SHOW: Your chosen hand must rank either 1st, 2nd, or 3rd.

EXACTA: You must pick the two hands ranked 1st & 2nd, in exact order.

TRIFECTA: You must pick the three hands ranked 1st, 2nd, & 3rd, in exact order.

SUPERFECTA: You must pick the four hands ranked 1st through 4th, in exact order.

CARRYOVERS

There are also three "Carryover" field wagers; all losing wagers are carried over and included in the next deal's pools until hit.

FOUR-OF-A-KIND: a wager that any of the 12 hands, or the FLOP hand, will include four-of-a-kind.

STRAIGHT FLUSH: a wager that any of the 12 hands, or the FLOP hand, will include a straight flush.

HIGH FLOP: a wager that the FLOP hand will be the highest-ranked hand (see notes on back).

SCORING

Listed below are the standard poker hands, ranked from 1) Highest to 9) Lowest:

- 1) Straight Flush
- 2) Four-of-a-Kind
- 3) Full House
- 4) Flush
- 5) Straight
- 6) Three-of-a-Kind
- 7) Two Pair
- 8) One Pair
- 9) High Card

UNIQUE FEATURES

Real cards are dealt by real people onto a real table, providing the highest degree of transparency and legitimacy.

All playing cards are dealt from a standard shuffle machine & shoe, ensuring random deals every time.

Instead of getting stuck with the hand you're dealt, you get to choose which hand (or hands) to play.

The game is broadcast live and simulcast to an unlimited number of players worldwide, providing the opportunity for huge pools and payoffs.

There is no player intervention, as all hands are "in" until the end of each deal.

All playing cards are exposed as they're dealt.

All odds and pari-mutuel wagers are generated and controlled through standard pari-mutuel totalizator systems.

SPECIAL RULES

HIGH FLOP

The "High Flop" Carryover wager is a completely independent proposition. This means two things:

- 1) Even if the High Flop hits, all 12 hands will be independently ranked for purposes of scoring other wagers.
- 2) This also means that each hand must use at least one of its hole cards in determining its rank.

EXOTICS

If no player wagers on a winning Superfecta combination of all four hands in the exact order, then that pool will be split among all players whose Superfecta wagers include the most number of hands in the correct order ... 1st / 2nd / 3rd / "all", for example. The same logic applies in the rare condition that no player wagers on an exact winning Trifecta or Exacta combination.

NO GUARANTEED MINIMUMS

Because so many cards are exposed, certain hands may be seen as extreme favorites even before wagering begins. If such a hand receives the vast majority of wagers, it is possible, due to takeout commissions, that *payoffs on such a hand may actually return less than the amount wagered*. There are no guaranteed minimum returns in Post Time Poker.
