Minutes of Meeting Held On
September 12, 2018**

1. WELCOME & CALL TO ORDER

At approximately 10:02 A.M., Chairman Duncan Patterson called the meeting to order.

2. APPROVAL OF MINUTES (August 22, 2018 MEETING)

Upon a motion duly made (Killeen) and seconded (Stegemeier), the minutes from the August 22, 2018 meeting were unanimously approved.

3. DECISION AND ORDERS

A. Mr. Angel Suarez – Appeal of Stewards’ Ruling 18-2018

Careless Riding – 7 Day Suspension (DTRC Rules 3.3, 14.15, and 14.16)

At this time, Deputy Attorney General Andrew Kerber presented the Commission with the Decision and Order for Mr. Angel Suarez's Appeal of Stewards Ruling 18-2018, which held a penalty of a 7 day suspension. Chairman Patterson, Commissioner Richard Levine, Commissioner Henry Decker, and Commissioner Killeen signed the Decision and Order. Secretary-Commissioner Edward Stegemeier did not sign the Decision and Order because he was not present for Mr. Suarez's Appeal at the August 22nd DTRC Meeting.

B. Mr. Trevor McCarthy – Appeal of Stewards' Ruling 35-2018 Careless Riding – 7 Day Suspension (DTRC Rules 3.4, 3.4.1.17, 3.4.1.17.1, 14.15, and 14.16)

At this time, Mr. Kerber presented the Commission with the Decision and Order for Mr. Trevor McCarthy's Appeal of Stewards Ruling 35-2018, which held a penalty of a 7 day suspension. Chairman Patterson, Commissioner Richard Levine, Commissioner Henry Decker, and Commissioner Killeen signed the Decision and Order. Secretary-Commissioner Edward Stegemeier did not sign the Decision and Order because he was not present for Mr. McCarthy's Appeal at the August 22nd DTRC Meeting. Chairman Patterson asked Mr. John Wayne if Mr. McCarthy's 7 days had been served yet. Mr. Wayne answered that Mr. McCarthy did serve his 7 day suspension.

4. OLD BUSINESS

A. Electronic Communication Devices in Jockeys' Room Rule Proposal

Mr. Kerber presented the Commission with drafts of proposed amendments to the DTRC Rules about the new consent to treatment forms and the allowance of electronic communication devices in the Jockeys' room. Proposed Rule 8.2.7 states,

"[Jockeys] must provide a signed Consent to Treatment form as required by the athletic training contractor providing training services to jockeys at the track."

Proposed Rule 8.10.2.1 states,

"Each rider in the Jockey room may use their electronic devices in the confines of the Jockey room, provided that (i) for purposes of this rule 8.10.2.1, the Jockey room does not include the balcony or any other area that may be in the view of the public; (ii) a Jockey's use of a mobile electronic device in the Jockey room signifies the Jockey's consent to a search of the mobile electronic device by or on behalf of the Commission; and (iii) a Jockey may not wear headphones while listening to their mobile electronic device if this does not allow the Jockey to hear when others are calling the Jockey to race."

A copy of the proposed regulations is being published in the October 1, 2018 edition of the Delaware Register of Regulations. Public comments on the amendments must be received on or before November 1, 2018. Following review of the public comment, the Commission will determine whether to amend its regulations by adopting the proposed rules, or make additional changes per the public comments possibly received.

Upon a motion duly made (Decker) and seconded (Killeen), the proposed amendments were approved. The vote was unanimous.

Chairman Patterson asked Mr. Robert Colton if he had any comments to make about these amendments. Mr. Colton expressed that he believes the use of the phrase "mobile electronic device" rather than "cell phone" is an accurate inclusion of other devices that jockeys may use besides cell phones (i.e., tablets, iPads).

Mr. Colton said that he has had some jockeys already sign the consent to treatment forms. The forms make it easier to oversee the athletic trainer's care over the jockeys.

Before moving on to New Business, Commissioner Levine asked the Stewards about a jockey who was subpoenaed to an appeal hearing at last month's Commission meeting as a witness, but failed to show up. He also alluded to his comments in the August 2018 Commission meeting minutes about how he thought there should be a clearer rule in place regarding the procedure when this happens. Mr. James Lages stated that the jockey was fined \$500.

The jockey expressed to Mr. Colton that he was upset about this penalty. If a jockey is not able to attend the Stewards' films, they can be interchanged and have someone else represent them, but in this case, the jockey himself needed to be present. Also, there were other witnesses who failed to show up to the hearing, but they were not penalized, which also upset him. The jockey suggested perhaps being able to call in to the meeting and testify telephonically, since he had other duties to tend to that morning. Mr. Colton told him that this would have been acceptable, but he failed to call ahead of time and ask the Commission for permission to do so.

Commissioner Decker asked Mr. Kerber what the Commission could possibly do in terms of penalizing those who fail to attend hearings that they are subpoenaed to. Mr. Kerber said that he could draft a proposal with whatever policies the Commission agrees upon. Mr. Kerber met with Stewards' Counsel Mr. Oliver Cleary after the August meeting, and they both agreed that based upon the existing rules, the Commission did have the authority to impose a \$500 fine.

Commissioner Levine said that he was concerned because the Commission rules can be interpreted to say that the Stewards and the Supreme Court are the only governing bodies who have the jurisdiction to enforce a subpoena from the Commission. Commissioner Decker disagreed. He said that to his understanding, the Commission can, in spite of the Stewards' action or lack thereof, take action in these cases. The Commission also has the power to take action in a case whether it is appealed or not, and impose whatever penalty they see fit.

Mr. Kerber said that he is certain that Stewards can refer cases to the Commission, but he is not sure if the Commission can take action completely on their own without a case being referred to them. The Stewards have the ability to enforce rules and enforce penalties, and the Stewards are a part of the Commission.

Commissioner Decker asked how the Commission should take up the matter of an inadequate fine. Commissioner Levine suggested a rule proposal that states, if a witness fails to appear to a hearing, the Commission should have the right to fine or suspend the person. Commissioner Decker asked why this should only apply to subpoenas. He asked, why can't the Commission overturn any ruling that they disagree with (without the case being appealed)?

Mr. Lages explained the concept of "catch-all rules" that the Stewards have. Mr. Lages pointed out that the Commission also has their own "catch-all rules", under 19.5.12, which states that:

"The Commission may take official notice of technical facts or customs or procedures common to racing."

Mr. Lages also read aloud Rule 19.5.13, which states:

"The Commission may make an informal disposition of the matter by stipulation, agreed settlement, consent order or default."

Mr. Wayne said that the Commission has broad authority over the regulation of racing. If the Stewards make a decision that the Commission does not agree with, the Commission does have the right to review the case and overturn it. Commissioner Decker said that he did not clearly see this in the Commission rules.

Commissioner Levine made a motion that the Commission ask the counsel to review two topics for the next meeting. The first topic would be the existence of a rule giving the Commission explicit authority to enforce disciplinary action in regards to subpoenas. The second would be to consider a rule to allow the Commission, by certiorari, to review any decision of the Stewards. Commissioner Decker seconded this motion.

Mr. Lages brought up Rule 5.1.2, which states:

“The Commission in its discretion, may refuse to register or to issue an authorization or permit to an applicant, or may suspend or revoke a registration, permit, or authorization previously issued, or order disciplinary measures”.

Commissioner Levine stated that he would just like to have Mr. Kerber review these rules, and if the Commission does already have jurisdiction to do this, then he will simply report that at the next meeting and the Commission will have to go no further with the subject.

Mr. Kerber presented the following Rule, Rule 3.4.1.16,

“The Stewards may not impose a fine in excess of \$2500.00. If it is at any time deemed appropriate that a larger fine should be imposed, the Stewards shall so recommend to the Commission and shall refer the matter at hand forthwith to the Commission. The Stewards shall have the power to refer any matter before them to the Commission at any time if it appears proper because of the complexity, severity, uniqueness or extent of the activities involved or likely to be involved. Included within these powers is the authority to impose partial sanctions, such as a conditional limitation on any person's use of facilities or of the enclosure.”

On a vote of 4-1 (Decker), it was decided that after the presentation of this existing rule that it was not necessary for Mr. Kerber to further review this topic.

5. NEW BUSINESS

At this time, there was no new business to discuss.

6. REPORT FROM DTRC EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

At this time, Mr. Wayne presented his Summary of Activities report for the month of July, 2018.

Mr. Wayne said that the day prior was the annual Jockeys' trip to Nemour's Al duPont Hospital to visit children with illnesses. Leading riders Carol Cedeno, Keiber Coa, retired jockey and Safety Steward Robert Colton, valet Tony Marrone, Delaware Park's Chris Sobicinski, and Mr. Wayne all attended. Gift bags and toys from The Delaware Horsemen's Association, The Jockeys' Guild, and Delaware Park were given out to the children. Mr. Wayne posted pictures of the event on Facebook and sent a link of his post to Stacey Hoffman with the Department of Agriculture. Delaware Park also did a press release. September is Childhood Cancer Awareness Month. This was the 7th year that the group has done this and it is in conjunction with what the Jockeys Guild is doing nationally. Mr. Wayne explained that the hospital just developed a new "Clubhouse", where children and families can play games and interact.

Two news articles were released in the month of August as well. Mr. Wayne provided copies to the Commissioners. The first article was in The Paulick Report about the new agreement that will fund an athletic trainer for Delaware Park's jockeys. The second article was about new Steward Cynthia Smith on the website, theracingbiz.com.

7. REPORT FROM DTRC CHIEF STATE STEWARD

8. REPORT FROM DTRC CHIEF COMMISSION VETERINARIAN – HEALTH REPORT AND INFORMATION

After previously speaking with Secretary-Commissioner Stegemeier, who brought it to his attention, Chairman Patterson asked Dr. Susan Botts if she was aware of any people taking horses off-track to have unrecorded shockwave therapy, who may possibly be racing horses within the 10-day period. Dr. Botts said that she had never specifically seen proof of it, but she has heard of this taking place. Dr. Botts has reported allegations to Mr. Colton, but has seen no proof of it herself because farms are private property and it is difficult to surveil them.

The veterinarians currently use in and out slips and health certificates, which determine where a horse is being shipped. However, it is hard to determine what is really happening to the horses while on the farms. Dr. Botts also added that it is impossible to tell which horses have been shock-waved and which have not.

Mr. Wayne noted that another concern is people using nerve blocking agents on horses. The Commission agreed.

Chairman Patterson suggested to Mr. John Mooney that perhaps the Commission could check the in and out slips to determine which horses are being taken off grounds. This method has been used in past circumstances regarding the same issue.

Secretary-Commissioner Stegemeier asked Mr. Wayne how farms could possibly be surveilled, and if the Commission had the right to inspect private property. Mr. Wayne said that this would be difficult. Mr. Wayne referenced the Stewards' previous suggestion that a horse not be allowed to leave the grounds if it is entered in a race at Delaware Park unless the Stewards or the racing secretary gives written permission.

Chairman Patterson noted that 40% of entries are ship-ins. This is 40% of horses that the Commission has no control over outside of the racetrack. The ARCI Model Rule says that a horse may not be shock-waved 10 days before racing. The Commission has adopted this rule also.

Mr. Wayne asked if the Commission wished to adopt a rule which states that horses may not leave the grounds if entered in a race at Delaware Park, unless permission is given by the racing secretary or Stewards. Commissioner Decker said that he did not believe that a rule was needed. Mr. Wayne asked Mr. Mooney if this would impact the operation of racing. Mr. Mooney answered that horses are not permitted to leave the ground currently unless they have an out slip. This is a house rule. Chairman Patterson said that the situation will continue to be monitored.

At this time, Dr. Botts presented her report for the month of August. There were 4 fatalities for the month. One fatality was due to a hind-leg fracture, two were sesamoid fractures, and one was undetermined, suspected of being either a pelvis or high femur injury. Chairman Patterson asked if Dr. Botts believed that the sesamoid fatalities were due to people being too aggressive with injecting ankles. Dr. Botts answered that this is hard to say. Chairman Patterson asked if any of the fatalities were in horses with the same trainer(s). Dr. Botts answered that all 4 horses had different trainers.

Secretary-Commissioner Stegemeier asked Chairman Patterson what the Commission was going to do about the fact that horses were being taken off the track and potentially administered shockwave therapy. Even though it is a Delaware Park house rule not to do so, it is not actively being enforced. Chairman Patterson answered that this is a security issue. Secretary-Commissioner suggested that if this becomes a Commission rule and was enforced consistently, perhaps it would happen less often. Chairman Patterson said that it would still have to be enforced by security. They must make a record of which horses come and leave the facility. Mr. Wayne agreed that there may be issues in horse identification. It is crucial to know if the same horse that left the track is the same horse returning. Security is not properly trained to check lip tattoos. Ms. Bessie Gruwell suggested that perhaps when horses are given microchips, that will be an easier way to identify the horse. The Commission agreed, but this won't take place for another few years.

Ms. Gruwell said that she has not heard anything from the horsemen about this issue. Mr. Wayne explained that there were complaints from a veterinarian about horses being taken off-track to be treated by individuals who are not medically trained to do so. Secretary-Commissioner Stegemeier said that horses are being taken off of the track under the premise that they are undergoing swimming therapy. However, horses in training that undergo swimming therapy regress. Swimming therapy should only be used in horses that are injured or are being rehabilitated.

Secretary-Commissioner Stegemeier explained that he is very passionate about this issue, especially with the concerning amount of 4 horses being lost in the month of August.

Chairman Patterson sympathized because the Commission serves to protect the best interest of the horse, but in some situations there is nothing they can do, aside from having the medication reviewed.

Commissioner Killeen suggested that though the Commission may not have control over the issue, perhaps they can review the monitoring of the problem. Chairman Patterson noted that most trainers do abide by the rules, and the others will almost always find a way to go around the rules if they choose to do so.

Mr. Mooney asked the Commission if they possibly knew a date that the horses lost in August were taken off the grounds. Secretary-Commissioner Stegemeier said that he did not have an exact date, but called the process of horses coming and leaving the track a “revolving door”.

Secretary-Commissioner Stegemeier asked Mr. Wayne if other states have rules concerning returns and shockwave therapy. Mr. Wayne answered that tracks which have adopted the ARCI Model Rules also follow the 10-day policy. He would have to research other jurisdictions’ rules about returning the horse to the facility. He agreed to conduct a national survey. Mr. Wayne did note, however, that since Delaware Park is surrounded by many neighboring jurisdictions, horses have more potential places to go, whereas horses in more isolated areas usually stay at the racetracks they are stabled in.

Secretary-Commissioner Stegemeier asked Dr. Botts if there were many cases of dehydration so far in the meet. Dr. Botts answered that early in the meet, there were a few cases of heat stress in some horses. Some of the horses shipped from Florida. She stated that dehydration may have been a part of the heat stress. Chairman Patterson asked her if she thought the horses were getting used to the weather. Dr. Botts replied to the affirmative, that she does believe they adapted to the weather.

Secretary-Commissioner Stegemeier asked if an electrolyte paste could be administered to horses any time before race day. Ms. Gruwell said that a trainer is not allowed to have electrolytes in their feed because of the 24-hour rule, and that is one of her biggest complaints from horsemen.

Investigator Sarah Crane said that in warmer climates such as New Mexico, electrolyte paste is administered to horses at the time of Salix. Secretary-Commissioner Stegemeier said that since human athletes need electrolytes and hydration before and during a race, it’s unreasonable to think that a horse wouldn’t need them as well. The Commission serves to protect human athletes and the integrity of racing, but the horse’s well-being is at risk also.

Chairman Patterson expressed concerns about this also and said that it was counter-intuitive. Mr. Wayne noted that electrolyte pastes and powders can interfere with the testing results. Ms. Gruwell explained that it can come up in the TC02 tests.

9. REPORT FROM THOROUGHBRED HORSEMEN’S ASSOCIATION

A. Delaware Certified Thoroughbred Program Report

At this time, Ms. Bessie Gruwell presented the Delaware Certified Thoroughbred Program Report for the month of August. 15 applications for the program were received in August, bringing the total

number of applications to 59 for the year. So far in the meet, the program had 211 Delaware Certified horses start 414 times, with 61 wins, 65 seconds, and 78 thirds. \$98,092.52 was paid out in owners' and certifiers' bonuses, and the total amount paid out was \$628,740.00. The Special Account gained interest of \$882.78, bringing the total amount in the Special Account to \$857,988.20. Ms. Gruwell announced that Owners' Day is coming up on September 29th along with the running of Delaware Certified Stakes races. The Horsemen's Golf Classic Tournament was supposed to take place on Friday the 14th but due to inclement weather, it has been rescheduled to Friday the 28th.

Secretary-Commissioner Stegemeier asked Ms. Gruwell how close the Special Account will be to reaching \$1,000,000.00 in 2018. Ms. Gruwell answered that it will reach to more than it did last year, but the program is now paying back to 4th and 5th place finishers so that will have an effect on it as well.

10. PUBLIC COMMENT

Chairman Patterson asked Mr. Mooney how he is making plans to fill races through the end of the meet. Mr. Mooney explained that it will be very difficult. 100 horses left the grounds of Delaware Park in the past couple of weeks. Many trainers went to Kentucky to take advantage of the high purses. Chairman Patterson commended Mr. Mooney for his incredible job on filling races. Mr. Mooney said that quite a few fields have been very short so far this year.

Mr. Mooney expressed frustration about the vet observed policy. According to Mr. Mooney, there are high-percentage trainers who, when they think they cannot win a race, get a slip from the veterinarian and are put on the vet observed list. A 10 day penalty is issued for this, but Mr. Mooney doesn't believe that 10 days is enough. He is contemplating making the penalty for more days to deter trainers from the practice.

Secretary-Commissioner Stegemeier asked Mr. Mooney about the loss of 100 horses that went to Kentucky. He asked if other tracks were experiencing the same thing. Mr. Mooney said that other tracks definitely are. Nearly every horse running at Kentucky Downs is from the Mid-Atlantic.

Chairman Patterson asked Mr. Kevin DeLucia about the state of sports betting. Mr. DeLucia reported that things are going as expected for the football season. The first college football weekend was a holiday weekend and though it was not as successful as Mr. DeLucia expected, he said that it was still positive. Mr. DeLucia expressed that sports bettors usually place their bets and then leave the casino. The casino will start hosting promotions to entice bettors to stay around longer.

Mr. DeLucia also reported that the live handle is down by about 14%, but simulcast was up about 15%.

Secretary-Commissioner Stegemeier asked how Ms. Appleby and Ms. Crane's investigations were going. Ms. Appleby answered that she and Ms. Crane have been kept busy with the recent case they have been working on. They also reported that everything was running smoothly in the licensing office.

Secretary-Commissioner Stegemeier also commended Mr. Sobicinski for his good job writing recent press releases.

11. EXECUTIVE SESSION

Upon a motion duly made (Kileen) and seconded (Levine), public session was moved to executive session at the upper floor of the Horsemen's Office at approximately 11:30 am to discuss personnel and pending litigation matters.

12. ADJOURNMENT

Upon a motion duly made (Levine) and seconded (Decker), public session was moved back to order at 12:40 pm and adjourned at approximately 12:42 pm.
