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MR. CARWELL: Good afternoon,
everyone. Welcome. I declare this public hearing to be open. My name is John Carwell. I'm the charter school officer for the charter school office of the Department of Education.

And the Sussex Academy of Arts and Sciences Charter School has filed an application to modify its charter. As is required by law, this matter was referred to the charter school accountability committee for investigation and report. This joint public hearing is being held by the Department of Education and the State Board of Education.

And I do want to give just a moment to acknowledge our State Board members. George Melendez is here, Dr. Jim Wilson, and the State Board Executive Director Donna Johnson, as well. Thank you.

So, as I mentioned, this joint public hearing is being held by the Department of Education and the State Board of Education, and to give the school an opportunity to respond to the final report of the charter school accountability committee, which recommended that
the school's modification application be approved, and also to receive public comments.

I'd like the record to reflect that the notice of the time, date, and place of this public hearing was published in the Delaware -- the News Journal, the Delaware State News, on February 27th, 2012.

In addition, notice was posted at the charter school accountability committee's place of business, and on the Department of Education's official website and on the State public meeting calendar on the State's official website, on February 27th, 2012.

Further, Sussex Academy of Arts and Sciences was notified personally of the date and time of this meeting at the final meeting, which was held on February the 17th, 2012.

Just to note, a court reporter is present so that a record of this hearing can be made. It will be necessary for each speaker to clearly identify him or herself before beginning to speak, so that the court reporter will be able to know who you are.

The record of this hearing will be
provided to the Secretary of Education and members of the State Board of Education, together with any written or electronic comments received at or before this hearing, which includes, actually, none. We haven't received any written comments in advance of this meeting.

So, we will proceed in the following manner: First we will hear from any representatives of the charter school who wish to comment on the committee's final report. And then we'll take comments from anyone else who desires to speak.

There are sign-up sheets at the back of the room. Are there any individuals who desire to speak who have not signed up? Will you please identify yourself by show of hands.

Okay. Great. And if you do desire to speak, please let me know who you are. Okay.

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Oh. Sorry.
(Show of hands)
MR. CARWELL: Okay. That's helpful.
So if necessary, we might need to impose time limits, but it doesn't appear that we'll need to do so.

So, with that, let's hear from representatives of the school. Yes?

DR. OLIPHANT: Good afternoon. Thank you very much. My name is Patricia Oliphant of Georgetown, Delaware. I'm executive director at Sussex Academy of Arts and Sciences. We appreciate this opportunity today to come and speak on behalf of Sussex Academy of Arts and Sciences, and our intent to add grades 9 through 12 to the school under the name of Sussex Preparatory Academy.

We would like to put on the public record that our school will continue to provide a small alternative choice for Sussex County high school students. We will continue with an accelerated academic program, with the intention to place all graduates in college.

We will infuse an authentic
project-based learning and community service into our instructional program. We will continue with our sound and transparent financial operations, and we will further foster home/school connections that are integral to student performance and success.

Our intention is to prepare students very well in Sussex County. And we thank -- we thank the accountability committee for its -- for giving us the go-ahead at this point. I hope that things will continue. And we pledge to do the very best we can by the students who attend. Thank you.

MR. CARWELL: Thank you,
Dr. Oliphant. Yes?
MR. SWINGLE: Good afternoon. My name is Dean Swingle. I'm the vice president of the board for the Sussex Academy of Arts and Sciences, and $I$ am the director of finance for Nanticoke Health Services. And as a parent of two children who have attended the Academy, and as a current board member, I would like to express my support for the expansion of our school.

I would also like to -- excuse me -I would also like to point out that our current school has always been well-managed financially, and we currently have approximately five months worth of expense in reserve.

Thank you.

MR. CARWELL: Thank you,
Mr. Swingle.
MS. DAVIS: I'm Andi Davis. I'm a parent. I have a student at the Sussex Academy. As a parent of a seventh grade student at Sussex Academy, I've found that one of the best things about the Academy is that parents, students, teachers, and staff all work together to create the most successful learning environment.

To start, parents have to put in the extra effort required for their child to attend SAAS. This means we have parents who feel it is the best educational choice for their child and will do what is necessary to make that happen.

There are many ways for parents to help make this school successful for all students. We have an active PTO that raises money throughout the year to pay for computers in the computer lab, as well as fund enriching activities for the students.

For example, last year we helped fund Poetry Alive, and this year we'll be having an author visit in May. To show how parents, teachers, and students work together, two dances
were held to raise money for the upcoming author visit. One was conducted by the reading teachers and one by the PTO. For both dances, teachers, parents and students all worked together to help make the dances successful.

Because of our limited sports funding, our sports boosters, which consists of parents and school staff, worked together to raise money so that we are able to hire coaches, buy equipment, pay for officials, and field rentals.

Being involved as a parent is not just about raising money. Parents are encouraged to attend field work with their students, which provides them with an even greater understanding of what their child is learning.

Parents are also an integral part of various school activities, such as clubs and academic competitive teams, such as Science Olympiad and Odyssey of the Mind.

Because everyone works together to make SAAS a successful school, parents are an accepted and valued part of that school. I am very interested in my son attending the Sussex

Preparatory Academy for high school. Because of my experience at SAAS as an involved parent, I would like to see a continuation of the cooperative spirit that helps make SAAS students so successful, and $I$ know many other parents that feel the same way.

MR. CARWELL: Thank you.
MR. HINDMAN: Can I say something?
MR. CARWELL: Sure.
MR. HINDMAN: Ladies and gentlemen,
we had at the back of the room this evening some sign-up sheets that people have signed their names on. The purpose of these sheets was intended to collect the names of individuals who wanted to make public comments on the record tonight.

So, I think what we're going to do is we're going to go through these lists. If you signed it and didn't mean to say anything, just let us know. That's fine. If you didn't sign it and you have something you want to say at the end, after we've gone through the list of folks who have signed up, we'll come back and ask if there's anybody else who wants to make a comment,
okay? So why don't you just go down that. MR. CARWELL: Sure.

MASTER SAXON: Good afternoon, I am Sam Saxon, a student from the Sussex Academy of Arts and Sciences Middle School in Georgetown, Delaware. I began there in sixth grade and have never ceased to be challenged.

My parents first heard about it by word of mouth from another family who had a child go there. I was immediately signed up for the lottery, and that was the day that my life changed for the better, and it's been the greatest experience since.

And now $I$ hear that they want to make a high school, which makes me really excited. I believe the success of SAAS has been its small size, making all of us in it like a family. We all rely on each other and share each other's feelings.

We also use something unique to our schedule called expeditionary learning, which is where the grades all intermingle to learn one common subject. This further creates a bonding atmosphere. If this could spread to a high
school, it would be amazing. Our school family could then expand to welcome new older kids, and if they so choose, the same kids from sixth grade.

Our instructional focus is a charter school offering accelerated cooperative learning opportunities for middle school students. I hope this can now include high school students, too. Thank you.

MR. CARWELL: Thank you. At this point, we'll hear from any other individuals who desire to speak. I'll start down the list. Brian White?

MR. WHITE: No.
MR. CARWELL: Dave Shapley?
MR. SHAPLEY: No.
MR. CARWELL: Allen Stafford?
MR. STAFFORD: I have a few
comments. I'm Allen Stafford, I'm the director of Sussex Academy. There's three points I'd like to make. One, the time is right. We have a very energetic group that has a lot of momentum. The business community and other community members are behind this, and will ensure the success.

Two, the need is undeniable.
Demographic studies show that there are two age groups that are growing, and will continue to grow, and that's those under 18 and those 55 and over.

Both of those groups need services.
Our vision is to prepare our students for college, and bring them back to provide the legal, educational, medical, and other professional services that these groups are going to need.

And three, the impact on the other districts in our county will be negligible, in my opinion. The largest portion of our students attend Sussex Tech. Sussex Tech has a waiting list, so it's going to put them in a position to be able to provide services to more students in Sussex County.

MR. CARWELL: Thank you.
MR. STAFFORD: Uh-huh.
MR. CARWELL: Jason and Anna
Moshier?
MS. MOSHIER: No.
MR. CARWELL: Paul Eckrich?

MR. ECKRICH: No thanks.
MR. CARWELL: Mariah Calagione?
MS. CALAGIONE: That's me I'm just
here to sort of -- not as a parent of a SAAS student, but $I$ am a parent of two children who will at some point in the next couple years be in high school in Sussex County. But I am also here today because I'm a business owner in Sussex County.

My husband and I have Dogfish Head Brewery in Milton, and we are recruiting and hiring people to the tune of 30 to 40 new positions a year. And we do run up against challenges of having fewer than -- many, many other places where we're recruiting from, school options for kids in Sussex County.

There are definitely some of our coworkers that are looking for the traditional large public school, some that are looking for the Delmarva Christian kind of school, and some that are willing to have their children, you know, commute two hours a day to a smaller college preparatory type environment.

But we feel that having that in

Sussex County is not only a benefit to the students that are at SAAS now, and the students that will go to the school, but also the employers of the area who are trying to recruit and bring people from outside the area to Sussex County, to call this their home.

It's another sort of opportunity for
us to -- to bring those folks to our area, and you know, call this home, and have their kids go to this type of school that we currently don't have in Sussex County.

MR. HINDMAN: Oh. She's spoken
already.
MR. CARWELL: Yeah. Lori Carter?
Is that --
MS. CARTER: No, thank you.
MR. CARWELL: Okay. Hannah Roberts?
MS. ROBERTS: No, thank you.
MR. CARWELL: Takashi Rhoulac?
MS. RHOULAC: No, thank you.

MR. CARWELL: And Debbie Scanlan?
MS. SCANLAN: No, thank you.
MR. CARWELL: Okay.
MR. HINDMAN: Ask if there's anyone else.

MR. CARWELL: Is there anyone else
that wishes to speak on behalf of this application? Okay. If not, I want to thank you all for participating today. The Secretary will consider your comments, along with the State Board of Education, and this hearing is now closed. Thank you very much.
